She shows me love when my young husband gives me a gift certificate listing things he will do for me during the coming year. Somehow this seems to be getting closer to the real meaning of the

Christmas Past flashes Christmas in the 60's before my eyes. The overspending and over-indulgence. She sees a conscience emerging about the Christ of the western world. As our children cried out for expensive toys the children of the world cried out for food.

Education learned Thursday. Business and finance superintendent Bruce Lindley tabled figures showing that the 1977 budget cost of teaching each of 29,467 elementary pupils is \$1,136, an Increase in the 1976 figure of \$1,019 for 30,311 pupils.

The 1977 cost for 20,966 secondary school students is up to \$1,744 each from the 1976 figure of \$1,587 when enrollment was lower at 20,481. that the cost per pupil in Halton for the various functions of the board compares "very favourably" with that of other school boards, Mr. Lindley said.

The Halton Roman Catholic separate school board spends \$1,131 to teach each of its 8,184 comparison figures, the lowest

The board with the highest cost per elementary pupil in 1977 is Ottawa where it spends \$1,793 each on 18,479 pupils, followed by Metro Toronto with \$208,407 pupils at a cost of

The board with the lowest cost per elementary pupil besides the Halton Roman Catholic separate school board · is in Durham region where it cost \$1,114 each for 28,875

In the secondary panel the boards of Metro Toronto and The cost analysis indicates. Ottawa are tied for first place with costs of \$2,296 per pupil. The Metro board has an enrollment of 142,231 and the Ottawa board 26,409.
