Senior's residence, a home feeling

A home-like atmosphere is the most important aspect of the Acton Seniors' Residence, owners Jack and Janet Booth

The Acton Sentors' Residence is a residence for healthy, ambulatory senior citizens. It is located on Mill Street in Acton, and they are looking for a few more people to move in. They hope eventually to have eight people living in the house.

The house is large, with four bedrooms upstairs and one in the basement. The Booths have completely redecorated it on their own in the last few months.

"We want to have room enough for everyone, but we want to keep it small enough for a home-like atmosphere," Janet said. She is a fully qualified nurse, with 11 years of experience in working with senior citizens.

Operating a senior citizens' home has been an ambition of Janet's "for about 10 years." It was in May that they decided to go ahead with the idea, and they've been working steadily at it ever since.

"The first thing we had to do was to move back here from Calgary," Jack said. Both he and Janet originally came from the Acton area.

"The people we have here already are very active." Janet said. "They enjoy going to the senior citizens' drop-in. and they would like to see more people going." The Booths have planned to have a woman come and in and teach the ladies such crafts asmacrame and crocheting if they are interested.

"We join in with the aclivities too, including meal times," Jack said."They enjoy having us with them, rather than being just a number or a customer."

All the residents are able to take part in some of the activities involved in keeping the house going, but only if they wish to. They aren't required to do anything, but the ladies may wish to help with preparing dinner or doing the dishes. There is also a large, private garden behind the house, where once summer comes, the residents may do a little gardening if they wish.

"They can do some gardening, or they can sit in the shade and watch somebody else go it," Jack said.

Residents have their own doctors for the most part, but people from out-of-town can visit the doctors in Acton. In . addition, residents are covered by insurance 24 hours a day, in case of a fall or some other: mishap.

"We've been encouraging the young people to visit here." Janet said."The service clubs are coming around as well." She pointed out that the house is well-located for shopping facilities. The only intersection between the house and the stores has traffic lights, she

"This is a place for people who are independent, but sometimes just don't feel up to it," Janet said. "We're trying to preserve their dignity-they lose it so fast."
