Sabres come back to tie Gems, Dixon furious over penalties

Georgetown Gemini coach Ron Dixon figures a third period melee cost his team an important point in the Central Junior "B" standings at Acton on Friday night.

The game eventually ended up in a 4-4 tie, but at the time of the incident at the 14:36 mark of the final period the Gems had the momentum and a 4-2 lead.

At that point a fight broke out between the Gems' Doug Barnes and the Sabres' Peter Wicklum. Gem Captain Terry Turner joined in the fight and was thrown out of the game for being the third man in.

Terry's brother Tim didn't like the call and argued it so referee Doug Woods threw him out of the game as well. Barnes had already been ejected from the game.

"I don't blame Barney because he was challenged," Dixon said. "But he was handling his own in the fight and there was no need for Terry to join in."

Aside from possibly costing the Gems a point, the incident also means that the Turner's will be lost to Georgetown for two games. The gems are very important ones as they are against Brampton and Burlington, two teams the Gems are chasing in the standings.

The Gems will probably dress Grant and Greg Bodnar for the two games. The twin brothers are at present playing with Way-Jay in the Georgetown Industrial League and are both among the top scorers. They both practiced with the Gems on Monday night and should be in the lineup tonight against Brampton.

Both teams tallied once in the opening period of the game in Acton. Kelly McArthur opened the scoring for the Sabres and John Krasnokutsky from Bob Allison replied for the Gems.

The Sabres opened the scoring in the second period as well as Scott Malcolm, from War-

ren Barnes, scored at the 4:34 mark.

The Gems then scored on two consecutive power plays to take the lead. Mark Eutenier, from Chris Milne, and Tim Turner, from Paul Ancinelli, were the marksmen. Wicklum was serving a roughing penalty when the first goal was scored and Rob Milligan was in for interference during the second goal.

Georgetown took a two-goal lead at the 5:43 mark of the final frame. The goal was scored by Bill Allison with Tony Giannini and Barnes earning assists.

Then the roof caved in on the Gems. Barnes received five minutes for fighting, 10 minutes for being the aggressor in the fight and an automatic two minutes. Tim Turner was given a 10-minute misconduct and another automatic two minutes. His brother Terry received the same penalty. The only Sabre penalized was Wicklum and he received

only a five minute fighting penalty.

Acton's Dave Chapman was already in the box serving a minor so the Sabres had a one-man advantage to begin with. Malcolm scored at the 15:27 mark to bring the Sabres to within one goal. Assists went to Jim Cartwright and Barnes. His goal cancelled one of the Gem minors.

When Chapman returned to the ice with only 3:10 left in the game the Sabres had a two-man advantage. Chapman scored the equalizer with only 2:45 left on the clock. The play was set up by Wade Vickery and Cartwright.

Dixon was fuming over his team's lack of discipline. "We

gave away a point because of those three penalties we took," he said. The coach said he will not tolerate those type of breaks in the future.

Brad Miller was again in the Gem net and he faced 23 shots. Thirteen of them came in the second period when the Sabres came away with only one goal. The Gems fired 23 shots at Robin Insoec who was in the Sabre net.
