Bantams show skill and poise to finish third in tournament

It was first anticipated as a two day safari to St. Clair Beaches Bantam Tournament, but it turned into a long week of fine, competitive hockey played by a well-disciplined and trained Georgetown Select (4 town) club. Twenty-four teams varying from regular house league to inter city (Division A) to select teams entered the tournament.

Georgetown Montego Construction set themselves up as the obvious team to beat when they thumped the host Shoreline team 8-1 in the opening game. Ken Ward, on a solo rush, opened the scoring. Tom Cull from Kevin Wilcocks and Ward then Cull from Brad Nicolucci from Ward added two more. Shoreline scored late in the second period to get back into the game. When the locals returned to the ice after the break, they literally flew at their opponents, executing breakout and passing patterns excellently to drive home five goals. Lindsay McQueen, Tyndall, Cull and Kevin Stewart with two were the shooters. Assists went to Bob Grashy (2) Scott Pentesco, Ward, Scott Brush and Stewart. Mark Dodge earned the win in goal.

On Thursday Georgetown drew a very small and spunky and Leamington team. Starting fast Nicolucci from Shawn Hutt and Grashy, Smith from Nicolucci and Tyndall from Ward and Grashy tallied for Georgetown, then the locals forgot their systems and team play, the Leamington scorers took over and tied the game. Georgetown apparently scored early into the third

period, putting the puck squarely in the middle of the net, but a dispute broke out with Leamington claiming the net was off its moorings. One referee called it was a goal but the other saying no, and finally the goal was waived off. Leamington scored the winner in overtime. It was a difficult game for Georgetown as they were continually berated with foul language and taunts from the adults in the crowd. The referee finally stopped the game and warned the spectators.

Facing elimination Georgetown drew a larger aggressive Essex Sanitary Plumbing team which was unbeaten. What they didn't know was they had a tiger by the tail as the 4-Towners smarting from their earlier loss came out flying and buried Essex 8-1 behind strong goaltending by Mark Dodge. Brad Nicolucci got the hat trick with singles going to Pentesco, Cull, Davis, Hutt and Ward. Assists went to Grashy (2), Smith (4), Tyndall (2), Brush, McQueen, Davis, Wilcocks, Cull and Pentesco. With defeat obvious, Essex resorted to dirty play and tried to provoke the bantams into fights. Coach Bill Richmond had to order his players to the dressing room when the first attempt to shake hands was met with a punch.

At the conclusion of play on Thursday, five teams were tied with four wins and one loss records. Georgetown with their superior goals for and against (28-8), drew the bye to the semi-finals which assured them of Bronze or third place finish. Again drawing Leamington, the 4 towners went down to a 3-1 defeat at the hands of the most spectacular goaltending of the tournament. The locals controlled the ice surface completely with precision passing and checking, but couldn't put the puck past a real hot goaltender. They outshot Leamington 57 to 19. Tyndall scored the only goal, along the ice in a goalmouth scramble in the first period. Two quick breaks on blocked shots at the point resulted in Leamington goals. The local boys were again subjected to considerable abuse from spectators even attacks in the penalty box, but they kept their cool, and showed true sportsmanship and walked away with class. The 4 towners display of hockey skills, systems and sportsmanship as well as team appearance could only make the GDMHA proud of their representatives.

The Rebels were knocked into the consolation section of the tournament by Grantham High School, the host team. They are the number one team in St. Catharines and went on to win the tournament. The score in the game was 54-26.

"We had trouble adjusting to the rims and boards which had a lot of spring," Leeking said. The Rebels shot only 22 per cent from the floor in the game.

Rick Fisher and Steve Keslick had five points apiece for the Rebels in the game and Mark Nelstrop led the rebounders with seven.

Leeking said his team played its best game against Ancaster in the first game of the consolation. They won the game 45-30.

John Karolidis led all the scorers as he pumped in 19. Nelstrop had 10 more and Keslick eight. Nelstrop also had 10 rebounds, Karolidis nine and Keslick eight.

Lamb led all rebounders in the game, which for a guard is unusual, and he also scored 10 points.

The Rebels moved into the consolation final by nipping Centennial 55-51. Georgetown trailed throughout the contest and it was an outstanding final quarter that spelled victory for them.

The Rebels trailed 29-25 at the half and 41-37 at the end of three quarters.

Krowchuck was the Rebel's big gun in the game as he scored 24 points.

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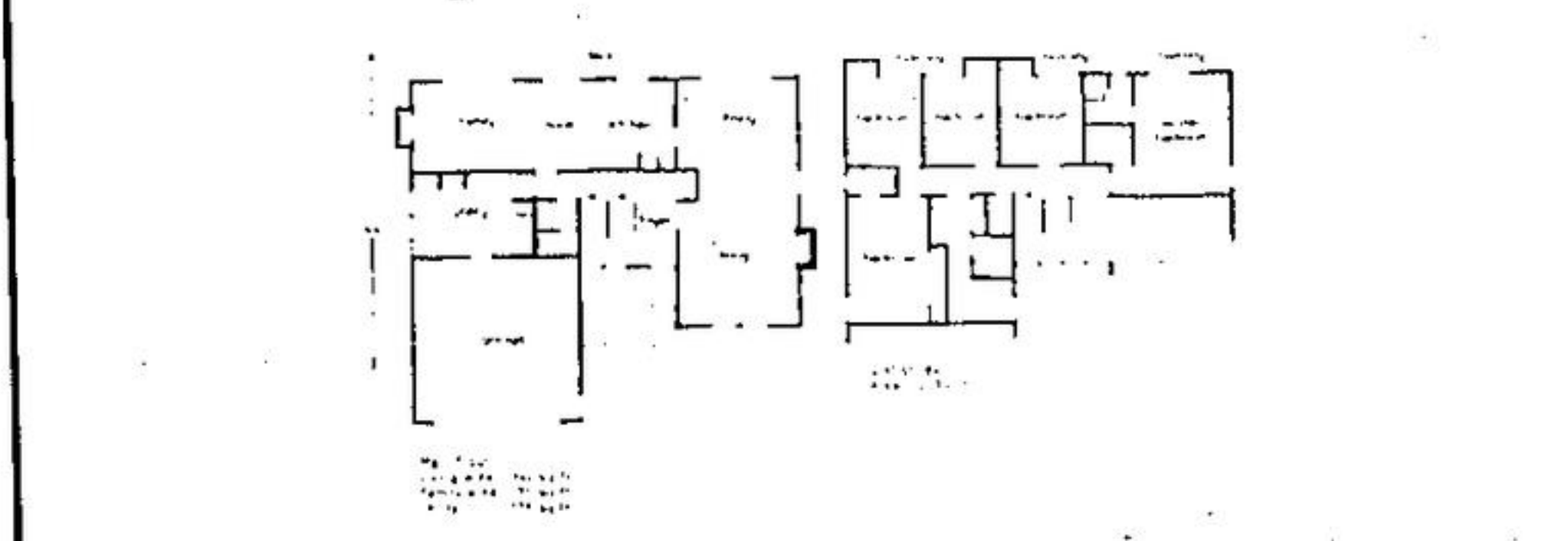
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NEW HOME OF THE WEEK



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The long sloping roofline, mixed vertical and diagonal siding and heavy shake roof give this one and one half storey, five bedroom, full basement contemporary design the rustic appearance of a mountain chalet.
The wide, weather sheltered entrance opens into a small foyer, which leads to the right into the large living dining room combination. The living room has a lofty sloping, beamed ceiling and a brick faced fireplace, re-inforcing the lodge or chalet mood of the home. The large dining room separates from the kitchen via pocket door and has access to the full width rear deck via sliding glass doors.
A well-planned U-shaped kitchen separates the dining room from the nook and family room combination, providing a good separation between formal dining and casual family meals. The large family room has a second brick faced and access to the rear deck via sliding glass doors.
A large utility room and downstairs two piece vanity bath are easily accessible to all downstairs areas. The utility room has laundry tub, washer, dryer and storage closet. Its access from the double garage enables it to be used as a mud room.
Upstairs are five bedrooms distributed around the central bath and linen storage. Four of the bedrooms have access to a rear balcony via sliding glass doors. The master bedroom has a walk-in closet behind a pocket door and a three piece ensuite with shower. The secondary or guest bedroom has a two piece ensuite vanity bath.
The main bath features double vanity sinks, lowered by fold doors on the storage closet and sliding door access to the tub. A sizeable storage area with window would be the ideal location for a whirlpool or a hot tub - adding to the convenience of an already luxurious home.
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
