

HUSKIES - See them in action at Cold Creek Conservation Area on Jna. 14, 28, 29, Feb. 4, 5, 25, 26, March 4, 5, and March, 11, 1978. Now that is a lot of chances to see these beautiful dogs in the time trial that will be held on those days, and if you can't get to one I am sure that you could fit one of the other dates into your busy schedule. They are well worth seeing and I am sure you will enjoy the many other activities that await you at Cold Creek. Time is 12 noon to 2 p.m. with one, two and three dog team

Cold Creek Conservation Area is situated half way between Bolton and Nobelton on Concession Road 11, just

north of King Side Road. Pike fishing is open until March 31, 1978 and the place to go is Fairy Lake in Acton if you don't wish to travel far. And I feel that your best chance of a big fish could be in the deep dark waters of that lake, And I guarantee the crowds will be absent. Walleye season is open to February and even March in certain areas, and on Lake Simcoe you may take Lake Trout until March 15, 1978 as well on Lake Temagami.

The ice fishing season is only awaiting the heavier touch of old man winter to thicken up the ice on the big takes and the panic will begin to set in as much as the short season will allow.

With all due respect to Floyd Hales of Beaverton, who is touted as the best guide on Lake Simcoe, there are others that have spent all their lives on that super lake. I spoke to one recently and am confident in his ability to get fish into his clients freezers. This man is Hank HYENINK who operates out of Jackson's Point. Last Friday (Jan. 6) Hank told me the ice was about 5 Inches thick which is too thin for safety on the take, but feels that things should be underway by Jan. 14. You may phone him at 416-722-3718 and I am sure that either he or his wife will be able to tell you the current conditions on the lake.

Saturday, Jan. 14 is also the last day for grouse hunting, in this area although rabbit and bares are still available until Feb. 28, 1978. If you head out as the rabbits do, with "snowshoes" you can enjoy an exciting time and a fruitful one as well. Some of the most exciting things in my estimation

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


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
