When "chumming" a hole, don't put much down as it will either create feed for the fish you are trying to catch or it will sour. Both are bad for your fishing success. When fishing for some of the pan fish species such as perch use a heavy sinker in order to get your line down to the feeding fish before they move off to another location.
