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Interested Citizen's Group (ICG) vice-chairman John Schneider suspects that the appointment of Reuben Baetz as the new Ontario Energy Minister last weekend is just "more political hanky panky" of the type that has stalled the group's efforts to get answers about the proposed Bradley-to-Milton 500 Ky transmission corridor, However Mr. Baetz is sincere in what he says, "we may really see some action," Mr. Schneider says.

Mr. Schneider finds Mr. Bactz's statement that "when sombody is suddenly told that a Hydro line is going through his back yard he has to be told why" to be very interesting.

"I interpret that to mean that he will immediately stop the corridor going through our area because no one knows why this route must be used," he says. He intends to ask Mr. Baetz for his interpretation of the statement as soon as pos-

Efforts by The Herald to reach Mr. Baelz for comment

Mr. Baetz will be energy minister number for that the ICG has had to deal with, Mr. Schneider says. He suggests, tongue-in-check, former energy minister James Taylor may have got in a little trouble by " it had been created," Mr. being too sensitive to the people's position instead of listening more closely to his fellow cabinet ministers.

"I don't think these guys (McKeough, Timbrell, Taylor) had all the facts," he says. "I'm afraid the decisions are being made by the bureaucrats the paid civil servants. On the other hand, Mr. Minns says, "Taylor was not strong enough to combat the negative forces in his own ministry and in cabinet. Baetz's lip service to his priorities is interesting but how much effect a new cabinet minister will have on years of deep-rooted problem remains

to be seen." Mr. Minns agrees with Mr.

Taylor's statement that Ontario Hydro is a cabinet minister's nightmare.

"There was political interference on a high level with Hydro's plans beginning with the first Energy Minister Dar-

cy McKeough in 1974," he says. "McKeough made a statement in July, 1974, which changed Hydro's priorities and systems planning. Each successive minister has tried to cope with that bad decision ever since and none has been able to overcome the problem

McKeough created." "Taylor put more weight on the people," he says.

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

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
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
