Reducing remedial pupils 'not possible'

A reduction in the number of pupils in Halton who need remedial assistance "is not possible in the immediate future," says a report presented to Halton board of education Thursday.

"Many factors which affect student learning cannot be controlled by a school system and therefore there will always be a need for remediation," says the report.

"Currently, 13 per cent of Halton elementary children have been identified as requiring remedial help," says the report.

Yet should the board carry out the report's recommendations, which are aimed at prevention of a need for remediation and correction, too "... it is possible there may be some reduction in the need for remediation in Halton schools."

According to figures in the report, 3,912 elementary students have been identified as needing remediation and of that number, 612 are on a waiting list. In North Halton there are 974 students in need of remediation, 74 of which are on the list.

Each remedial teacher has a case load of 100 pupils and the board would therefore need 11 more teachers.

"This is the first time we have had a waiting list," Ron Chapman, superintendent of special program, said. In reply to trustee Bill Herd who asked why there was no waiting list last year, Mr. Chapman said "perhaps screening and identification devices are sharper than in the past."

Chairman of the ad hoc committee on remedial remediation was Ted Pordage, an administrative assistant to John Boich, superintendent of program. Mr. Pordage said it is difficult to define a student needing remediation but the working definition used by the committee was a student "who has average or above average potential and is significantly behind in achievement particularly in language and or mathematics."

Students in special education programs were not included in the definition.

The report says that most of the remediation is in language with mathematics next.

Mr. Pordage said that the best motivator for students "is the classroom teacher."

"It is hoped that a training program will be established to equip teachers with better skills to recognize needs in all areas," Mr. Pordage said.

The board moved that the report be referred to the executive committee to examine the cost implications of the recommendations.
