The Georgetown Gemini outshot the Milton Flyers 42-24, but were still on the short end of a 4-2 score in Central Junior "B" hockey action at Milton on Friday night.

Gem general manager Bob Tost said his team dominated the Flyers, but were unable to put the puck in the net. Flyer goaltender Ian Roberts stopped the Gems when

they did shoot the puck on net, but Tost said on many other chances the Gems missed the net altogether.

Dave Turner put the Flyers ahead 1-0 with the only marker of the first period. It was the only period in which the Gems were outshot.

Bob McCandless tied the score for the Gems at the 4:36 mark of the second period. The Gems were enjoying a manpower advantage at the time McCandless scored.

Milton tallied twice in the middle frame to go up 3-1. Brian Gordon scored on a power play and Ron Shulders also had a marker.

Paul Ancinelli brought the Gems back to within one early in the third period. McCandless, who played one of his best games since coming off the injury list, and Doug Barnes earned the assists.

The Gems outshot the Flyers 16-5 in the final period, but managed to get the puck by Roberts only the once. Paul Martin scored for Milton late in the game to make the final 4-2.

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Ontario Outdoors

Outdoor Whites of Canada

Some time ago I wrote about the Ministry of Natural Resources program called STRATEGIC PLANNING FOR ONTARIO FISHERIES (SPOF). I have available a few copies of this program release available for CLUBS and public ADVISORY GROUPS. These may be obtained by contacting me care of the HALTON HILLS HERALD or by phoning 877-9290. SPOF gives three answers to the problems we face in Ontario in regards to sports fisheries:

1) A Federal-Provincial Agreement for fisheries, 2) A Resident Angling License and 3) An increase in Funding, staff, and facilities on a PRIORITY basis. If these things are brought to fruition, then we can expect a better sports fishery in Ontario. Maybe never as good as the one in New York, but we are behind in everything else when it comes to sports of the type we associate with the outdoors.

There has been a lot of flack in regards to the area known as Lake St. Lawrence. The duck hunting in that area has long been known for its quality and developers have had their eye on it for housing and possibly a marina. Now the Ministry has put out a Master Plan for the Lake St. Lawrence area of southeastern Ontario. This is in the approval in principle stage, but the area will be designated as THE LAKE ST. LAWRENCE WILDLIFE PLANNING AREA and will be specially managed for wildlife. It was the first area in Ontario to attract the interest of Ducks Unlimited. The Ministry proposed to improve wildlife hunting and viewing opportunities and it should prove to be a good project.

One thing about this bad weather we are experiencing, it gives us a chance to catch up on some of our reading. I have just finished the BIG GAME HUNTERS DIGEST by DBI, Inc. One of the most interesting parts of the whole book in my mind was the ones on how to dress out your trophy for the taxidermist and a section on the taxidermy art itself.

A collection of these books should be in every hunters' library and the number of times you will go back to these books make them a good buy. In regards to the coming fishing season, I must refer you to the two most valuable books that a fisherman in Ontario can have. These are "30 FISHING HOT SPOTS" by Alex Eberspacher and the "ONTARIO FISHING GUIDE" by Hines-Herringer-Jenson. These two books will help you to plan almost any fishing trip in Ontario and for further information in regards to these books give me a call.

I have just gotten off the phone to HANK HEYNINK of Jacksons Point and he is just going out to clear up after the storm of the past few days. Today (Friday) it is clearing but Hank says that they may have to lift a few or maybe all of the ice huts they have out. They will be well prepared for the weekend and they are booked solid. However, don't let this sway you from going up as they always have cancellations and some just don't turn up. As always it is best to phone ahead and book enough for yourself or party and be sure of getting in some of the fine fishing. Mr. Heynink tells me that the fishing is GOOD this year with Lake Trout, Whitefish and Herring making up the bulk of the catch. What else can we ask for when ice fishing in ONTARIO OUTDOORS.

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
