There should be a lot of penalties taken in this series so Milne may see a lot of Ice time as he is usually also on the power play. Like Barnes, Milne will have to have a good offensive showing for the

John Krasnokutsky - Krasnokutsky has found a home at center. He was originally a centreman and looked uncomfortable playing the wing earlier this year. He is reaching his peak at the right time.


Bob Alliston - He is one of the smallest players in the lineup. He has good speed, but he may not see much skating room against the Derbys.
