Order yourself a copy of the information bulletin WINTER OUTDOORS 1977-78 published by the ministry of natural resources.

This bulletin covers the provincial parks and trails with a listing of the areas that provide cross country skiing, snowmobiling, snowshoeing and hiking, and is an excellent way of learning the restrictions and facilities provided.

The Huskies are still running at Cold Creek. The dates are Feb. 25, 26 and March 4, 5 and 11.

The Cold Creek Conservation Area is open with the dog trial from 10 a.m. to sundown, seven days a week. Cold Creek is located half way between Bolton and Nettleton on the King Side Road. Take Concession road 11 north at the signs and you can't get lost.

The Ontario government recently transferred 1,878 square kilometers of Ontario Crown land to the Federal Government. This converts to about 725 miles and will be designated as the Pukaskwa National Park. The park will benefit the communities of Marathon, Terrace Bay, White River and Wawa with the economic and employment opportunities and should increase the existing recreation possibilities along the Lake Superior shoreline.

Ice fishing is really good to excellent on Lake Simcoe this year by all reports that I have had. One fisherman told me that he spent a few short hours on the lake and landed four nice sized Lake Trout. The first one kept for dinner and the rest were released unharmed. This of course is a good policy and is recommended by the Minister of Natural Resources, in order to better the fishery for Lake Trout in the lake.

The catch of whitefish is increasing which is good news to many veteran Lake Simcoe fishermen. The number of whitefish has been apparently decreasing over the last few years, although a "Spawning Count" showed good numbers of fish. It looks as though things are changing due to the better control of contaminants in the area and the effluent going into Lake Simcoe. Better pollution control and sewage systems are to be noted in particular, and the enforcement of cottage septic system laws.

A far cry from Lake Simcoe and ice fishing is the report just received from the ministry on Lake Chemung and other Kawartha Lakes. The Eurasian Watermilfoil is a fast growing water weed that chokes the channels and eventually blocks huge portions of the lake. A program was undertaken by the ministry of natural resources and the ministry of environment during the summer of 1977 and it looks as if the mechanical harvesting of the weed has done some good along some herbicide control.

Last weekend saw the annual conference of the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters in the Constellation Hotel in Milton. News was not available at the time of the writing of this column but I will fill you in on the details next week.

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Rebels go to tourney final before bowing to Brebeuf

The Georgetown district high school junior basketball Rebels went to the finals of the Orillia Blackball Tournament before bowing to Hamilton St. Jean Brebeuf 56-40.

Guard Scott Turner was named the Most Valuable Player in the tournament and received a plaque dedicated to Iver Wynne.

In the first game of the tourney Georgetown went up against Port Perry and downed them 34-20. Turner was hot from the outside in this game and hit for 17 points. Steve Keslick had eight points.

In the second game Turner hit a shot with just 39:37 win over Kipling Collegiate of Toronto. Keslick had 11 points in this game and John Karolidis 10.

Coach Moe Leeking said the Rebels played better in their first game than in the Kipling game.

The Rebels had to go up against the number one Hamilton team, St. Jean Brebeuf, in the final. Brebeuf had size, speed and good shooting. Earlier in the tournament they had beaten Oshawa and Orillia by 30 and 40 points respectively.

Brebeuf started out as if they were going to run the Rebels off the court. They had a 19-0 lead before the Rebels even realized they were in a basketball game.

The Rebels fought back and by utilizing the fast break effectively had cut the lead to 18-14 by the end of the first quarter. Leeking said that poor foul shooting accounted for the Rebels 34-25 halftime deficit.

Leeking said that Rick Fisher, Gord Miller, Mark Nelstrop and Karolidis all put forward excellent efforts, as well as Turner and Keslick during the tournament.

Earlier in the week the Rebels split two league encounters. They were edged 39-38 by Milton and then defeated Acton 57-30.

Leeking said that Milton utilized their superior height well to take advantage of the Rebels on the boards. He also said that Milton effectively cut down the Rebel fast break by slowing down the pace of the game.

"We were reluctant to run, which is our game, and we missed too many foul shots again," Leeking said.

Keslick and Turner were again the offensive leaders for the Rebels as they scored 14 and 12 points respectively. Karolidis had seven and Nelstrop was good for five. Keslick was the leading rebounder with six and Karolidis, Nelstrop and Turner had three each. Fisher and Turner both had three assists.

The pressure was on the Rebels against Acton. They needed a victory to have a winning record in league play. Leeking said that his team must win the remainder of its

games, after the loss to Milton, to be assured of a playoff spot.

The Rebels responded to the pressure and won going away after leading only 23-20 at the half. Leeking said it was the Rebel's press and fast break which accounted for the good second half showing.

Leeking also utilized his whole squad in the game. In the second half he rotated units of five players and thus his fresh troops outran the tired Acton squad.

Karolidis had a great two-way game as he scored 10 points and pulled down nine rebounds. The leading scorer was Keslick with 13. Fisher also had 10, Miller nine, Nelstrop eight, Turner four, Dave Chamberlain two and Rob Rivers one.

Nelstrop had eight rebounds, Keslick seven and Miller six. Miller, who also played a strong game, also had five steals. Turner was the big playmaker with five assists.
