LICENCE FEES ARE AS FOLLOWS:

1. Female or male \$8.00

2. Spayed female or Neutered male \$5.00

3. Kennel Licence \$25.00

In accordance with By-law 74-75 and Its' amendments, every owner of a dog on or before the 15th day of February of each year, or within 7 days of becoming the owner of a dog after the 15th day of February, shall register each dog with the collector and apply to him for a licence and tag for each
