Athletics improved after losing first six games

The Thorold Athletics have to be the most improved team in the O.H.A. Intermediate "A" loop. They lost their first six games this season, but have come on strong lately and may challenge for second place before the season is out.

Dave Creighton, a former NHL player and who coached at the professional level for some time, started out the season as the Athletics coach. However, after the team's poor start he was replaced by general manager Bob Urquhart.

"Dave had trouble communicating with the players," Urquhart said. "He was used to the professional game and you can't coach in this league the way you would coach in the pros."

Urquhart said the Athletic lineup is much different than the lineup which won the league pennant last year.

"I don't think we have the talent we did last year, but we're better in a lot of other areas of the game," the coach said.

Urquhart figures that his team and the Georgetown Chrysler Raiders will battle it out for the league title.

"Dundas is ahead of us right now, but we've beaten them badly the last two times we've met," Urquhart said.

The Athletics have won 11 of their last 16 games with the same basic lineup that lost the season's first six games. The biggest addition to the club is goaltender Bill Cheropita. The former St. Catharines Fin Cup has to be rated along with the Raiders' Mario MacDonald, as one of the league's top goaltenders. He has been a standout in the last two games in which the Athletics have visited Alcott Arena to play Georgetown.

Urquhart said the main thing that has kept his team going is character. "After we lost our first six games we never turned to violence as many other teams would do... we kept plugging away and then began to win."

Urquhart's assessment of the Dundas Merchants may have been altered after this interview when they dumped the Raiders 8-2 on Sunday. The previous Friday the Raiders defeated the Athletics 4-2.

In accordance with By-law 74-75 and its' amendments, every owner of a dog on or before the 15th day of February of each year, or within 7 days of becoming the owner of a dog after the 15th day of February, shall register each dog with the collector and apply to him for a licence and tag for each dog.

Every person who fails to comply with Section 2 or Section 7 of this By-law is guilty of an offense and upon conviction is liable to a fine of not more than Fifty (\$50.00) dollars exclusive of costs, and every such fine shall be recoverable under the provisions of the Summary Convictions Act, R.S.O. 1970.
