# Junior Rebels win in overtime will now go up against Milton

The Georgetown high school junior Rebels won an exciting overtime sudden death playoff game 60-52 here on Tuesday over Blakelock. Blakelock is now eliminated from the playoffs but they did not go out without giving the Rebels a tremendous battle.

Georgetown coach Moe Leeking said, "It was a real barnburner. I think the great fan support we received really helped us."

Leeking was worried at this point that Blakelock would have the momentum going its way in the overtime. The coach utilizes his whole squad and this helped in the overtime as his fresher troops ran the visitors ragged to win going away.

Steve Keslick was again the leading scorer with 15. Floor leader Scott Turner was second with 14 points. Rick Fisher, who showed good hustle, had 12. John Karolidis, who displayed great ballhandling, had nine.

Gord Miller had one of his best games of the season as he scored eight points, pulled down nine rebounds, got four assists and made three steals. Keslick was the leading rebounder with 12.

The Rebels will play another sudden death playoff game today against Milton. Last week the Rebels split two games, going down to the same Blakelock team 54-47 and then they defeated Queen Elizabeth Park 47-38.

The Rebels let Blakelock get away from them in the second and third quarters when they scored only 19 points to Blakelock's 32. In the second

Doug Lamb and Norm Ibbi, who have been the only consistent seniors this year, were again the leaders in those two games.

The Rebels were never in the Blakelock game as they trailed 19-7 after the first quarter. Lamb was the leading scorer in this game with 16 points. Ibbi had six and also was the floor leader. Bill Rivers, who

was excellent on offense, had 12 points and Phil Dellio and Rob Hatcher had two points each.

Lamb, Rivers and Ibbi each had three rebounds. It was the boards which Blakelock controlled best. They had a very noticeable height advantage on the Rebels.

Georgetown was right in the game against Q.E. Park for the first half. The score was tied at 14 after the quarter and only 30-27 in favor of Q.E. at

the half. However, the Rebels were only able to score 12 points in the second half.

Lamb scored 22 points in this game. Rivers had nine and Ibbi and Dellio four each. Ibbi led the rebounders with nine and Lamb pulled down six. Rivers had three and Dellio two.

The Rebels used midgets Jim Rowntree and Brian Davis and juniors Jim Allan and Ian Masini and all of them performed admirably.

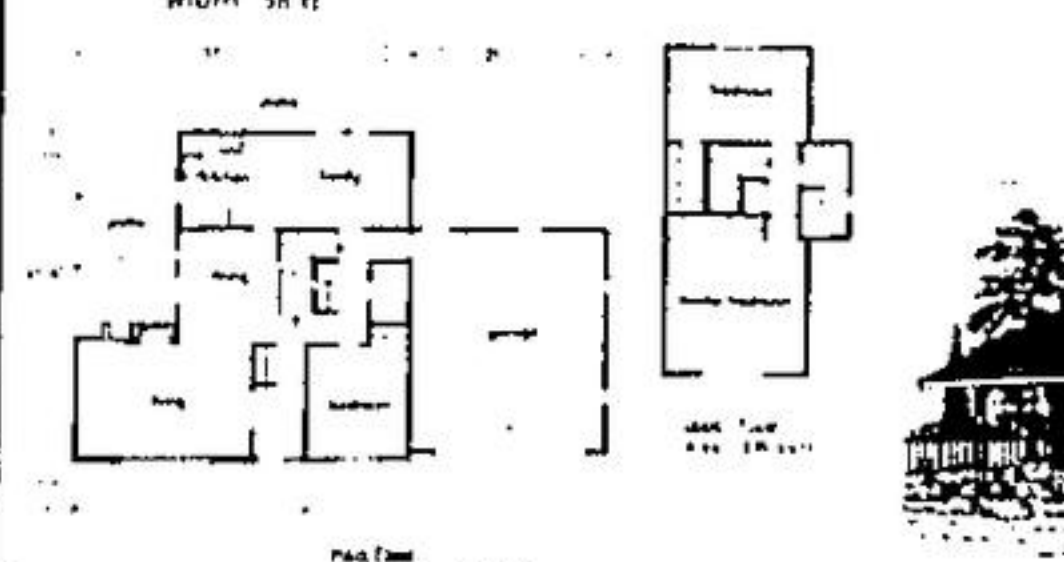

## Raiders drop two games to Thorold and Dundas
