Georgetown Y's donation 'one hell of a contribution'

The size of Georgetown YM-YWCA's contribution to an international development project in Peru should "put every Y in the country to shame," says a member of the Y's south central region.

Al Whittall, executive director of the Guelph Y, told members present at the sixteenth annual meeting last week that they had made "one hell of a contribution" to the fund which was set up to establish a self-help program in Lima.

Their share of the funds (\$5,000) donated to the program by members of the south central region was all out of proportion to the size of the branch, he said.

After showing slides of the area of Lima in which the project is located, Mr. Whittall proceeded to show slides of a

second project in which Georgetown Y has been invited to participate.

The Y in Antigua is one of the examples of the bad international development projects which the Y used to sponsor, Mr. Whittall said.

It was set up in a special building similar to a Canadian Y, its programs were the type suited to Canadians and it was staffed by Canadians. In short it was a Canadian Y, with all Canadian standards transported into Antigua and expected to meet Antigua's needs. Its programs were not filled and gradually the building was allowed to run down.

The only program which never completely folded was the day care for pre-schoolers. This program is meeting a need in Antigua, Mr. Whittall

says, because there is no government day care available on the island and thus it is a basis on which the Antigua Y can begin to build into other programs which the people need.

The Georgetown Y may continue to support the Peruvian project, may switch over to the Antigua project, or may support both projects, Mr. Whittall said.

After the meeting, Doreen Burt, executive director of the Georgetown Y, explained that Georgetown had been able to contribute such a large sum

to international development because the money has been accumulating for several years.

"Money collected for international development can't be used for other purpose like current expenses for the branch," she said. "Since our region didn't have an international development project for our money to be used on it was set aside until we had a project."

The money has been collected through Y.O.U. walks and similar fundraising projects over the past several years, Mrs. Burt explained.

Cadets seek members

Georgetown Army Cadets League will be holding a promotion campaign on March 19 with hopes of increasing enrollment, commanding officer Captain John Hodskins says.

Lorne Scots Cadet Corps is looking for young people, male and female, between the ages of 13 and 18. A feature film will be shown March 19 and following the film a discussion will be held to explain army cadet activities and procedures.

Captain Hodskins said the corps parades at the Georgetown army, Wednesdays at 7:15 p.m. in the meetings they discuss basic military knowledge, map reading and citizenship and leadership training. Extra weekend activities are held.

Captain Hodskins works with a staff of five: Lieutenant T. Hegarty, Officer-Cadet Frank Phillips, Officer-Cadet A. Ross, Civilian Instructor E. Hodskins and Sergeant Gary Ewing from The Lorne Scots Regiment.

The cadets have a busy program planned for the future. In March they will go to the firing range at CFB Borden in April the cadets will enter the Crazy Boat Race, they'll be taking a trip to the Ontario Science Centre and also a trip to the McLaughlin Planetarium. In May they are going to see a Toronto Blue Jays game and in June they'll be going to Toronto Island.

Those who join up before March 31 are eligible for the Cadet summer camp. Courses in scuba diving, parachuting and photography are offered. The camps usually run for either two or six weeks. \$100 bonus will be given to the cadet at the end of the summer.

Older cadets, that is those with several years experience who are at least sixteen years old may work as instructors during the summer.

Presently there are 11 cadets enrolled and Captain Hodskins welcomes anyone to come and join their unit.

Rotary campaign for crippled kids

For the first time, the annual Easter Seal appeal will not end on Easter Sunday. Instead, the official campaign period will run from March 1 to April 2.

Easter Sunday falls on March 26 this year and the Rotary Club of Georgetown's campaign chairman Bud Busher feels that having the campaign period include Easter instead of ending with it will give his hard working members a better chance to reach their objective.

The Ontario Society for Crippled Children's overall provincial objective is \$2,500,000 and Georgetown's share of that objective is \$1,000.

In announcing the objective, Chairman Bishop paid warm tribute to local residents who have supported the club's Easter Seal appeal in previous years.

"We hope to count on their

support again," he said, "and we also make a special appeal to those who, for one reason or another, have not yet made an Easter Seal donation."

Last year, Georgetown residents contributed \$1,547.50 to help the club in its efforts on behalf of physically handicapped children. Half of

these funds remained with the club for direct services for these children within the

community. The remainder went to the Ontario Society for Crippled Children to provid

province-wide services beyond the scope of any one community.

Y starts with \$4,758

The Georgetown Y is beginning 1978 with \$4,758 to meet its expenses.

A financial statement released at the annual meeting last week shows that a fundraising campaign last fall earned \$6,402 for the organization. Of that amount \$1,938 had to be used to meet

the Y's deficit through the end of 1977.

Executive director Doreen Burt says a ways and means committee has been formed but the members have not yet met to discuss what fund raising projects will be undertaken in 1978.

Street banner issue is town's responsibility

Works committee has recommended that Halton Hills should seek to exercise its own control over the raising of special event street banners and to some extent over the closure of town roads for parades and other functions.

A banner proclaiming the importance of cancer research will be hung above Mill Street in Acton during April with the committee's blessing.

A similar request from the cancer society for a Georgetown street, however, has forced the committee to direct the society to Halton region, which has jurisdiction over the street in question, Maple Avenue.

Town engineer Bob Austin advised the committee to

instruct the society to ask the Acton Legion for permission to raise the cancer flag at the United Church Cenotaph during April.

Coun. Mike Armstrong wondered whether the region's permission is always required for the hanging of banners above regional roads in Halton Hills.

"I'm sure the region could care less," he said. "It's just a lot more paperwork for someone."

Coun. Pat McKenzie pointed out that regional engineer Bob Moore has the authority to grant permission for such road uses without first approaching regional council.

Coun. George Malby motioned for council to ask the region for carte blanche permission for Halton Hills to approve the raising of banners at its own discretion.

The closure of roads for parades and other purposes, however, should still be placed before Mr. Moore's for approval Mr. Austin said.

Minor injuries

A pedestrian suffered only minor injuries after being struck by a car in Acton last week.

Jacob Kutz, 71, of Kitchener, was crossing Mill Street when he was struck by a car driven by Phillip Hottel, 22, of Oakville. Witnesses said the car was about 15 car lengths away from Mr. Kutz when he stepped out on to the road, but the driver's sight was obstructed by an on-coming car.

Mr. Kutz suffered only a scratch to his face. There was no damage done to the car.
