IMMERSION POLICY APPROVED

Hinton charges French program a disservice

A policy of 50 per cent French immersion classes for Grades 1 and 7 was adopted Thursday be Halton board of education despite charges by trustee H.H. (Bert) Hinton that it was a disservice to French instruction and would do more harm than good in Ontario.

By a 10-7 vote the board adopted the policy and seven administrative guidelines.

which it had asked of the administration when it earlier rejected specific proposals for French immersion classes,

Trustee Hinton said he hates to see the board do as poor a job teaching French as it has English. The board hasn't got

staff, qualified instructors nor a strong curriculum to offer French immersion. "The whole thing is misguided." The guidelines are that parents must apply by March 15

Halton board of education. Trustee Edna Robinson, who proposed the committee Thursday, said that in order to implement changes by September, 1979, the committee should make its report by Nov. 1. An interim report may be

The study will address such questions as: Is it really necessary to offer such a variety? Does this smorgasbord of courses increase the cost? What abjectives do these courses achieve? What is their effect on class size and teacher workload? Are the basics being neglected in favor of "soft" options or "frills?"

The committee will be comprised of five trustees,

to have their children enrolled in French immersion classes but application is no guarantee of admission; that before a class can be registered, the number of students registered must be at least equal to the average class size currently in

The guidelines note that in the grade 1 program, enrolments will have to be higher than normal to accommodate

Other guidelines are that the director of education will delermine the location of the classes, that the staffing of the classes be from within the regular education area pupilteacher ratio and that parents must provide their own transportation to the classes.

Superintendent of program, Bruce Mather told trustees that when the students reach high school there would be established an "extended program" of French language instruction. It would be language instruction plus another subject but this was for the board to decide, he said.

He said there has been "a tremendous amount" of re-

search since 1971 on French immersion programs for which "there seems to be very significant support."

John Boich, superintendent of instruction, said the program could result in some "redundancy" of teachers in light of declining enrollment and also current collective bargaining

But the biggest effect is on the staff per se, Mr. Boich said. He indicated that class sizes between French immersion and English classes could not be too different. Applicants to the program will be screened, Mr. Mather

said. The screening process

covers the social, emotional,

physical, academic and health

aspects of each applicant as

well as interviews with the teacher, the school principal, the child and the parents. If not enough applicants pass the screening to form a class, "it could delete the possibility

of a class," Mr. Mather said. Trustee Dr. Helen Howard-Lock disputed trustee Hinton's point that the immersion program is misguided. She said those who have a second lan-


