
Police beat

Thieves stole the wheel covers from a 1978 Oldsmobile Cutlass parked on the lot at



Council defers approval The on Alcott Arena plaza

Halton Hills council met again last night (Tuesday) after failing Monday to approve construction of a \$2 million shopping centre adjacent to Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena.

Some councillors felt they did not have enough information about two sidewalks and a eurb town staff have a commended that the developer. Gerry Sprackman, bulld.

Mr. Sprackman's lawyer, Ed Sonshine, said dealings had beein going on with town staff for three months and everything was settled but for a road between the proposed plaza and the arena, sidewalks and pedestrian control at the traffie lights on Guelph Street and a drainage agreement.

Mr. Sonshine said the developer will build a road costing about \$65,000 and maintain it for two years. Agreement had been reached with the Canadian National Railway to use a drainage ditch on the railway's property, Mr. Sonshine said, but because the agreement was not in perpetuity the developer was willing to put on the site control agreement the condition that he would spend \$100,000 to install a pumping station.

Mr. Sonshine said town staff had recommended that the developer buy 20 foot easements across five properties between the site and Sinclair Avenue He indicated that a better route to follow would be fore the town to expropriate the easements.

But it was over the issue of sidewalks and curbs that council failed to pass the legisla-

Apparently, recreation director Glen Gray has asked that about 200 short posts around an island in front of the arena be replaced with curbs, a proposat the developer disagreed with as did Mayor Tom Hill.

"We shouldn't be asking someone else to develop our lands," the mayor said, "We

can't go for this." Town engineer Robert Austin had requested a sidewalk within the proposed development and another along Guelph Street in accordance with suggestions by the coroner and ministry of the attorney-general.

Both absent staff members came under criticism for making the requests and some councillors said it was the first they had heard of sidewalks. Tuesday, and curbs in the development.

Mr. Sonshine said the two request would cost \$15,000 plus \$3,000 for pedestrian control at the traffic light.

During discussion on whether to pass the legislation, conflicting remarks were made about what staff had told one or the other councillor. while some councillors argued that' they wouldn't make a decision on the sidewalks without questioning the town engineer first. Council then be-

came embroiled in procedural matters until Mayor Hill finally called another council meeting to deal with the matter The plaza is to be serviced

Turnout small to discuss school twinning

While parents at both rural schools suggested as twinning partners for urban schools in North Halton are desperately opposing the proposal, parents at the urban schools have shown an almost total lack of interest in the suggestion.

Meetings held Wednesday evening at Joseph Gibbons school in Georgetown and Robert Little school in Acton drew only two interested parents to hear the reasoning behind the suggestion that Gibbons and Limehouse schools be twinned while Speyside and Little schools will be combined under the guidance of one

principal Gibbons' principal Tom Gibson says he had inquiries of what twinning would involve after he sent home a letter to parents indicating that twinning is being considered for the school and a meeting would be held at which a board representative would be present to

answer questions. Parents seemed content with the news that all it would mean would be the loss of a principal in Limehouse and a heavier work load for the Gibbons principal, he says.

They were reassured that it

would not involve busing children or putting more students in a classroom and so they had no quibble with board efforts to save money, he said.

As a result, only the Gibbons principal, a Herald reporter, and north area supervisor George Heaver and his wife showed up for the meeting.

Two Limehouse parents came to observe the reaction of the Gibbons parents and were greatly disappointed to find it so complacent that the meeting was abandoned

A similar meeting at Little school drew nine people. All but two of them were teacher, members of the press, or administration employees

Twinning schools is an attempt on the board's part to save the cost of one principal's salary in each pair of schools. The economy measure is recommended as one way of keeping costs down so that schools with dropping enrollments can be kept open as long as possible.

Gibbons schools opened in 1969 and hit a peak enrollment of 442 in 1972. The open concept school in Moore Park has 242 students this year and the predicted enrollment for September is 236. Continued on page 22
