The Thorold Athletics shocked the Georgetown Chrysler Raiders and their fans by taking a 4-1 win in the opening game of the best of seven Intermediate "A" semi-finals at Alcott Arena on Monday

night. The fact that Thorold won was not shocking, because the Athletics have a very talented team. It was with the ease in which they handled the Raiders in their own backyard.

Thorold took control of the game right from the opening whistle and never let up. Only outstanding goaltending by Mario MacDonald kept the Thorold tally down to four. They had an overwhelming territorial advantage in the first two periods, which were played almost exclusively in the Raider end of the rink.

Athletic general manager Bob Urquhart said after the game that he was not surprised his team won. However, he was surprised that the Raiders were not more physical.

"I thought they were going to come out and try to intimidate us," Urquhart said. "But even if they had, we would have been ready for that too." Urgubart figures the second game, which will be played in Thorold tonight, is the big one.

"If we win tonight I think we can knock them of in four straight," the coach said. "If they win it it could go seven." Urquhart also said that he will be going with his number one goaltender, Bill Cheropita, throughout the playoffs.

"He's as good a goaltender as has ever been in this league," the coach said of his goalie who has played professional with the Dollas Black Hawks of the Central League. "If we can score four goals a game we're sure to win."

Urquhart also made sure to mention that the Athletics handled the Raiders with their best scorer, Joe Young, out with the flu. Raider coach Junior Tibbitts

Kentner earns team two points

When Dave Kentner, general manger of the North Halton Sports Camp Novice Reps, saw the final standings of the league he figured something was wrong. His team was listed as the sixth best team in the league. They were behind both Guelph in fourth spot and Streetsville in fifth.

"I thought there had been a mistake made somewhere along the way because we had better goals for-goals against marks than either of those teams,"

So Kentner checked it out and there had indeed been a mistake made. A Georgetown win was given to Guelph by mistake.

"If you look at the standings in any league you'll see that a team's placing in the standings is directly related to their goals for goals against differences," Kentner said. "It is a rare case where a team with a worse difference between their goals for and goals against is ahead of a team with a better difference."

An interesting premise. So I went and bought myself a Globe and Mail and checked it out for myself. These statistics do not include the weekend's games.

In the National Hockey League the top 12 teams and their goals for-goal against differences are: 1. Montreal (131); 2. Buffalo (74), 3. New York Islanders (96), 4. Boston (86), 5. Philadelphia (79), 6, Toronto (46), 7. Chicago (6), 8. Atlanta (-9), 9. Los Angeles (8), 10. Pittsburgh (-35), Detroit (-23) and New York Rangers (-8).

There are actually only three teams which are in the same place in the standings as their place in the plus-minus category. They are Montreal, Toronto and Detroit. Buffalo is the only team which is a major exception to the rule. The Sabres are in second place, but

have only the fifth best goals for-goals against record. The standings according to goals for-goals against records are: 1. Montreal, 2. New York Islanders, 3. Boston, 4. Philadelphia 5. Buffalo 6. Toronto. 7. Los Angeles, 8. Chicago, 9. New York Rangers, 10. Atlanta, 11. Detroit and

12. Pittsburgh. Kentner's theory is dead on for the World Hockey Association standings. The standings and their goals for-goals against differences are: Winnipeg (112), New England (43), Edmonton (17), Houston (-7), Quebec (-13), Birmingham (-34), Cincinnati (-35) and Indianapolis

In the O.H.A. Major Junior 'A' League the theory comes close to being right, but there are some exceptions to the rule. The top eight clubs and their differences are: 1. Ottawa (84), Peterborough (38), 3. London (79), 4. Windsor (43),5. Hamilton (60), 6. Oshawa (36) 7. Kingston (-26) and 8. Kitchener (3). The standings for just the goals for-goals against records would read: 1. Ottawa, 2. London, 3. Hamilton, 4. Windsor, 5. Peterborough, 6. Oshawa, 7.

Barnes is a nifty player who relies more on finess and skating than he does on muscle or tenanciousness. In Juriar "B" there were teams that took runs at him to slow him down. He was also the Gems only prolific scorer so the teams could keep a special watch on him. . With the Raiders, Barnes is playing on a team that

includes the likes of Tom Daley, Juri Kudrasovs and Ray Evans so teams cannot concentrate on defensing against Barnes alone. The Raiders are also a team that cannot be

intimidated. They have players such as Daley, Neil Cotton Art Webster, and Bob Elinesky, who are all big and strong and not too many players are willing to challenge them. Therefore, the rest of the Raiders also get more skating With the Gems, Barnes was one of the oldest and biggest players on the team. Therefore he acted as a sort

of policeman, as well as top shooter, for the Gems. With the Raiders Barnes can concentrate on scoring and setting up goals and leave the fisticulfs to Webster and Elinesky, who are much better at it anyway. Ricky Becker also made his debut as a Raider at Alcott Arena on Friday night. He alternated with Barnes

on a line with Doug Tate and Bob Fotheringham. His style reminded me very much of Norm Ullman, who used to be with the Leafs. Becker does not possess the greatest speed in the world, but he always seems to be where the puck is and he is also an excellent playmaker. His style of play seems
