## A "holiday home" away from home

HAVE YOU EVER THOUGHT ABOUT SWAPPING YOUR HOME with someone far away as a means of arranging a comfortable and inexpensive summer holiday?

Charles and Marion Woolley, Gulf Islanders off the British Columbia coast, did just that a few years ago, following Mr. Woolley's retirement from the airline and travel industry.

They liked the entire concept so much that they have now become owners of their own Canadian-based home-exchange program.

"LOTS OF PEOPLE PREFER A HOME atmosphere to costly hotel or motel accommodation with limited facilities, particularly during a long vacation," said Mr. Woolley.

"While we are based in Canada, we operate in other countries," he explained. "We have subscribers in the United States, the Caribbean, Europe and the United Kingdom."

The service the Woolleys offer is basic, in that they publish a Canadian Holiday Home Exchange Directory, both for parties wishing to offer their own homes in exchange for other holiday residences listed in the directory, and to others interested simply in finding out what is on the market.

OBTAIN A LISTING by supplying a basic description of the home and whatever extra amenities are offered such as use of a car, for a fee of \$15.00. A photo of the home may be included in the directory for an extra \$5.00. Subscribers are also asked to list their own country of preference for their holiday. Interested parties wishing only to have a copy of the directory pay \$13.50.

The Woolleys do not become involved in the actual home exchange itself, leaving this to the subscribers to work out among themselves.
