Walter Scott, a safety engineer and chairman of the Halton Hills portion of the Interested Citizens Group (ICG), warned the committee of the danger. He said Ontario Hydro has asked him to be a consultant to investigate the

He said Ontario Hydro had agreed that frozen ground under the transmission towers is probably one of the worst possible conditions. Because electrical charges built up in the bus by induction won't bleed off into the ground.

Mr. Scott said a danger spot in Halton Hills will be on Steeles Avenue where the lines cross from the fifth concession to the Milton transformer stat-

Mr. Scott also said a researcher in New York state has warned that anyone living within a half mile of the line is a guinea pig.

He said an incident had been recorded where a line from a tower touched the ground and the charge, travelling through the ground, struck a herd of cattle, requiring that some of the cattle be destroyed. Charges from the corridor through Halton Hills could travel through to Georgelown and Oakville, Mr. Scott said.



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
