decision as to who will be responsible for maintaining the signs.

The area which caused concern with the engineering department was the proposal to build eight islands along Main Street. These islands would have park benches, flowers and possibly bicycle racks.

"I'm not going to give in to the concept of islands," town engineer Bob Austin said. "The road is there for moving traffic, not for planting flowers or sitting on a bench or putting in bicycle racks. I don't see it as benefitting the downtown merchants. I see it as hindering the works department."

Coun. Marilyn Serjeantson expressed concern that installing the islands would cut down the amount of parking available on Main Street.

"When I'm downtown, I always look for on-street parking before I park in a parking lot," she said. Installing the islands would mean the loss of 25 on-street parking places, although deputy engineer Ted Rallinger said the proposed locations of the islands are not people involved, or the entire in front of stores and banks with a high turnover in cus-"I'd just as soon send the

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#### Raylawn flooding caused by snow

Hallon Hills is not responsible for the flooding problem in an apartment building on Raylawn Crescent, Deputy Engineer Ted Ballinger reported to works committee Monday

The flooding problem was caused by snow blocking report drainage across land behind the apartment building, a re- report out verbatim because port says. The snow bank at the rear of the parking lot blocked the drainage of the run off on the lot. The snow bank was piled up over the winter months by the plows clearning the parking lot.

Residents in the area expressed concern that the flooding problem had been caused by the filling in of a ditch behind the properties on the north side of Raylawn Crescent Residents had requested the town to fill in the ditch after storm sewers were installed along the street in 1974, since they felt the ditch was a hazard. The town went ahead and

filled in the ditch during the summer of 1976, and recieved no complaints of flood problems during the spring runoff the following year The town has received a claim for water damages from

the owner of the apartment building, and the matter is now in the hands of the town's "We are of the opinion that the town is in no way responsthe for the damages," Mr.
