At present the curling club is made up of mainly senior members, but this year they did manage to ice a full team of four junior curlers. The juniors did not compete against clubs from other areas, but did manage to win a section of the men's house league division. "We're trying to get the kids interested and proficient enough to be able to compete with the men from other rinks. Most rinks don't

have junior teams because many schools already have curling leagues," said Hicking.

Although Acton high school did not have a curling team this year, the grade 11 and 12 physical education classes are taught the sport by Bruce Andrews and Anne Lepik. "Kids can really spoil it for others, by throwing the rocks too hard, or getting the ice dirty, but Mr. Andrews and

Mrs. Lepik have really looked after the ice well," said Hicking, who is in charge of keeping the arena's ice in top condition.

On Sunday, there were about 25 high school students taking part, and nine club members giving tips on curling. "We like to have the younger kids come out and be part of the curling club. Many of the members really enjoy teaching the younger kids. It's the only way we can get good curlers!" joked Hicking.
