He has talked to Junior Tibbitts and says there is no chance of him returning next year. Tibbitts said he was leaving as coach after the Raiders lost the league final to the Dundas Merchants.

Handy is not saying who the couple of people he has talked to are. Handy says he expects to see 75 per cent of the players from this year's Raider roster to be trying out for next year's squand. Handy also said he expects Colin Gordon, remember him, to be trying out for the team next year. Handy is have a tough time finding Gordon's phone number however, since he lost his phone book. He figures he lost the book in Thorold during the last game of the semi-final series.

The general manager said Gordon said when Tibbitts dropped him from the team during that same semi-final that he would like to try out next year. Gordon's problem this year was that he was not in shape. If he is with the team from the outset next year he could be trouble for the other teams.

Gordon will have a rough time making it as a center with the Raiders. Aside from goaltending, the Halders are strongest down the middle with Juri Kurasvos, Ray Evans, Ricky Becker and Chris Milne.

Rafferty said this year teams from Acton, Pineview. Georgetown and possibly Milton will have either jumor or senior, or both, teams competing in the league.


