The ONTARIO FEDERATION OF ANGLERS AND HUNTERS conducted a random survey at the Canadian National Sportsmen's Show. The survey was in regard to an angling license. The results were forwarded to the Hon. Frank Miller, Ministry of Natural Resources. It showed 86.5 per cent were in favor of a license. As it turned out, 76.4 per cent of the persons questioned were not members of the Federation. It is felt that this shows the fairness of the survey, reaching outside the 18,000 member organization.

I hope that these persons were signed up with the Federation as I am sure that this is the best way to make your views known. As you know I fully support the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters, and will continue to do so. I have the complete results of the survey if anyone is interested and will make them known on request.

Ontario Schools are to receive more than 30,000 wildlife educational kits from the Ministry of Natural Resources. The kits are in co-operation with the Canadian Wildlife Federation to promote the theme of "Wildlife Protection" during National Wildlife Week, April 10 through the 16. The Credit Valley Conservation Authority is reminding people that the ground is spongy and very vulnerable at this time of year. Please be careful when out

enjoying the spring weather. Don't destroy that which you are going out to see.  
 Tonight, April 12 is the meeting of the National Firearm's Association at the Georgetown Revolver Club property in Limehouse. The time is 7:30 p.m. and this is a very important meeting for anyone who owns a hunting or target rifle or shotgun. SALMON FISHING, Terry Campbell, ANGLING UNLIMITED ENTERPRISES, Terry runs a 23 foot, 4 1/2 ton Criss Craft with a stern drive. On this boat he carries \$1 million in insurance so you can see the care he takes of his clients. Terry has his boat rigged with four downriggers but these are rigged "double", that is one line of the cannonball and one line a few feet above. Bronte is where he most often runs out of, but will be moored at Grimsby during the COHO DERBY. I talked with Terry Campbell one day last week and he tells me that he has a "hot spot" for Smallmouth Bass that nets him all the five pounders he needs.

The Criss Craft will take six persons and the rate is about the same as the other charter boats, \$200 for an eight hour day. Share this cost between six persons and it is about the same as a run up north for some fishing, and I feel that it is well worth it. # Campbellton favored to take eastern Canadian championship

The Campbellton Tigers will be the favorite in the Eastern Canadian Intermediate Hockey Championships being played in Fredricton, New Brunswick this week.  
 Campbellton, which won the title last year, by defeating the Georgetown Raiders made it to the championships by defeating St. John four games to one in the New Brunswick final.

St. John upset Shediac four games to two to make it to the final, Shediac had finished 10 points ahead of the second-place St. John team during the regular season.

St. John did not add any players for the playoff, but Peter Maher, a journalist in Campbellton, said the team meshed together for the playoffs.

You will remember from Maher's piece in The Herald that Shediac was suspected of paying its players, including former pro Gordi Gallant, under the table in quest of the Hardy Cup. They were expected to battle it out with Campbellton for the New Brunswick title.

Mario MacDonald and the Dundas Merchants will be in the easier of the two divisions for the tournament. There are two divisions with each playing a round-robin tournament.

Dundas, the O.H.A. representative, is in a division with Fredricton, which got in as the host team, Timmings, the Northern Ontario Hockey Association representative, and Charlottetown, the Prince Edward Island representative.

The other division has the Enbrium Panthers, the Ot-

tawa Valley champs, the Candor Flyers, the Newfoundland champs as well as the Tigers.

The first place teams from each division will meet the second place teams from the other division. The semi-finals will be on Saturday and the final will be on Sunday.

Maher feels the Merchants stand an excellent chance of making it to the inter-division play on Saturday.

Campbellton has met Fredricton twice this season taking easy 9-3 and 10-6 decisions. Timmings was beaten by the Raiders in last year's playoffs. Maher does not expect them to challenge seriously.

Which all means that the

Merchants could finish first in their division. If that is the case they will more than likely meet Enbrium in the semi-final. That would be a good contest with the Merchants having to be the favorite.

If the Merchants finish second in their division they will have to go up against Campbellton, which is almost a shoe-in to win the other division. Everyone knows what the Tigers did to the Raiders last year.

Before leaving for Fredricton, Merchant coach Gil Eyre said he expected his team to fare well in New Brunswick. He said he would be surprised if any of the team there skated as well as his club does.

Don't be at all surprised if the Merchants go as far as the finals on Sunday. On that day if Eyre is smart he will use MacDonald in the net. The Raider goaltender when hot can be difficult to beat.

Although MacDonald had a 6.40 goals against average in the five-game final against the Merchants, Eyre had nothing but praise for him when the series was over.

If MacDonald is hot and the Merchants are flying, Campbellton, which is the heavy favorite to win, could be in for quite a game in the final. The arena in Fredricton holds 5,000 people and it should be full to capacity for the semis and final.

# Norval repeats as champs take Way-Jay in three

Brian Beaumont scored early in the first period and the goal stood up as Norval hung on to take a 1-0 win to give them the final series and championship in three games straight over Way-Jay.

A big crowd of approximately 500 was on hand to watch Norval take the league title again. Norval was forced to play the game with only two players, including their two goaltenders, as Bill Kirby and Jan Syme were suspended for one game each because of an altercation in the series' second game. Way-Jay's Noel Ing also was suspended for the game.

The lack of manpower did not stop Norval who were led by Beaumont who had five points in the three games. All the games were decided by one goal as Norval had previously taken two 3-2 decisions. Big crowds were on hand for all three games of the final which pitted the league's two top clubs during the regular season against one another. Way-Jay had edged out Norval for the pennant.

In the first game of the series Friday night Norval came back from a two-goal

deficit to take the lead in the series.  
 After a scoreless first period Greg Bodnar tallied from his brother Grant and Dave Weiburn to put Way-Jay ahead at the 8:46 mark of the first period.

Ben Heppes gave Way-Jay a two-goal cushion when he scored at the 6:40 mark of the third. It appeared that Way-Jay had the game in hand at this point, but Norval came storming back with three goals in the last half of the period.

Ray Ingis got them going when he scored from Syme and Beaumont. Syme then tallied from Beaumont and the latter scored the winner with only 49 seconds left to be played.

Way-Jay suffered a similar set back in the second game as Norval again scored in the final minute of play to tie the game and then took the victory with a goal in overtime.

Beaumont scored the game's initial goal from Syme and Ingis after only 43 seconds of play. Grant, from Greg, came back to tie the score at the 6:42 mark of the first period.

Dwayne Hay then put Way-Jay into the lead at the 7:51 mark of the third period after a scoreless second frame. Syme

sent the game into overtime with an assist going to Kirby with only 58 seconds showing on the clock.

Kirby scored the winner from Beaumont and Gene Ingis after only 2:46 had been played in overtime.

It was after Kirby scored that the fireworks began. After he scored Ing shoved him into the boards. Syme then went after Ing, Kirby got up and he too took after Ing. When the smoke cleared president Wayne King suspended all three players for one game.

In the final game Beaumont's goal, from Charlie Knoepfli and Jim Hillhouse, came at the 2:36 mark of the first period and Brian Laird kept Way-Jay off the score-sheet the rest of the way.

Way-Jay got into the final by taking a 2-0 win against Sandhill last Tuesday. Max Korzack's goal into an empty net insured the victory after Heppes had tallied midway through the first period. Ken Eckroth got the shutout, his second of the series, for Way-Jay. Way-Jay won the series 7 points to three after trailing three to one.

Norval got into the final by dumping Guelph-Clair Texaco

three games to one. Their one loss was because of a forfeit. In the series' last game Syme, Gene Ingis, Beaumont and Dave Holmes did the scoring after Larry Finlay had opened it for Texaco.

Beaumont, who was the leading scorer in the regular season, repeated the feat in the playoffs. He had eight goals and four assists for 12 points. Syme was second with four goals and five assists for nine points. Holmes, who was held scoreless by Way-Jay, was third with four goals and four assists. Grant Bodnar had five goals and two assists and Roger Chapman of Texaco had one goal and five assists.

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
