Right note struck

An eleventh hour appeal by Hamilton Philharmonic Orchestra (HPO) struck almost the right chord Wednesday with Halton regional council. HPO was turned down Nov. 3

when it asked for a \$5,000 grant. At that time and again Wednesday, spokesmen for the IIPO outlined activities of the orchestra in Halton.

John Ostler, HPO vice-president of financial development, told council the orchestra will perform 53 in-school concerts and 10 workshops in the region in 1977-78. Seventeen of the concerts and two workshops will be in North Halton.

The schools pay 15 to 17 per cent of the actual cost and the balance is subsidized by HPO, Mr. Ostler said.

As well, he said, subscribers from Halton have increased to 22.8 per cent (or 513) from 15 per cent last year for the major concert series in Hamilton Place.

Council passed a motion by Burlington Coun. Ben Ciprietti that a grant of \$3,000 be awarded.
