

Tom Gorman, the tour director of the Yugoslavian National hockey team's tour for the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, has filed his final report and it was more than complimentary of the work done by the Georgetown Raiders and their organization.

Mr. Gorman's report is in log format, and here are a few of the highlights in reference to the Ruiders. February 14, 1978

- 1830h Departed for Georgetown where a large banquet was being held for the Georgetown Hockey Heritage Association. Over 500 people were in attendance and Terry O'Reilly of Boston Bruins, the guest speaker took pictures with many of the (Yugoslavian) players. Aside from the Raiders, two other teams on the Yugoslavs' tour approached Gorman about the possibility of touring through Europe. They were the two tier two Junior "A" Quebec teams, Beauport and Thedford Mines.

The Thedford Mines operation is highly successful as the team averages 1,200 to 1,400 fans for their games. They had first place clinched by the time the Yugoslavs played there and had already met their \$100,000 budget. In Gorman's summary of the tour, he states, "This

tour was from a point of view of mobility, organization and value to the objectives involved, successful. The tour was not all peaches and cream however. Gorman also states that he was "very disappointed" at the reception the team received at various hotels. He says the

cost was much too high and the meals too expensive. "My only regret is that we could not keep the cost down, and I was a bit disappointed at the lack of publicity by some of the host teams," the report concludes.

Last week it stated in this paper that Georgetown Gemini defenseman Joe South, who won the league's top blueliner award, only had one year of junior eligibility left. In truth South could play two more years of junior.

That means if South decides to stay with the Gems he could have five years with the team before his junior eligibility runs out.

However, South says there is little chance he will be playing junior "B" hockey next year. He is hoping to land a university scholarship to the United States. The two universities that South is being considered

by and would like to attend are Notre Dame in Indiana and Michigan State. South also happens to be an excellent student and would like to become a chartered accountant. Both those two schools offer fine C.P.A. courses.

If South does not receive a scholarship offer he says he will remain in Canada and play hockey at the university he decides to attend. More than likely that university will be Queen's in Kingston.

South also said that the Gem season being so short may have hindered his chances of receiving a scholarship. .The Gems were knocked out in the first round by the Streetsville Derbys near the end of February. Most of the universities in the States were still competing at that time which means the coaches could not see South perform in
