Taxpayers can end their speculation

Halton Hills taxpayers who have been wondering not if their taxes are going up, but by how much can end their speculation.

For an "average" home in Georgetown assessed at \$5,615 the tax bill will be \$586.20, up \$59.23 over 1977.

For the same "average" home in Acton, assessed at \$4,489, the tax bill will be \$559.87, up \$21.90 over 1977.

Ratepayers in Esquesing with an assessment of \$4,619

will be paying \$519.31 which is \$43.32 more than last year. For the small number of Oakville homes, the increase in tax on an assessment of \$5,555 will be \$32.28 which will mean a tax bill of \$523.67.

The mill rate is made up of levies from Halton Hills, Halton region and Halton board of education, plus special urban service charges. What follows is a breakdown of the mill rates for the four areas in Halton Hills.

The total mill rate to be assessed against taxpayers in

Georgetown is 104.4 mills. This is made up of 29.85 mills for general government, 10.52 mills for Halton region, 26.81 mills for elementary education, which includes public and separate schools, and 24.1 mills for secondary schools. Special urban services—school crossing guards, garbage collection and street lighting—add 4.89 mills while Halton regional sewage charge is 6.43 mills.

In Acton the total mill rate is 129.85 mills. This is made up of 37.41 mills for general government, 13.19 mills for Halton

region, 35.92 mills for elementary education, and 30.32 mills for secondary schools. Special urban charges in Acton are 6.13 mills for crossing guards, garbage collection and street lighting plus 6.88 mills for Halton sewage charges.

Esquesing ratepayers will have a total mill rate of 112.43. This is made up of 35.6 mills for general government, 12 mills for Halton region, 35.2 mills for elementary schools, and 29.63 mills for secondary schools.

For Oakville, the rate for

general government is 29.7 mills, 10.47 mills for Halton region, 29.52 mills for elementary schools and 24.57 mills for secondary schools. The total mill rate is 94.27 mills. The due dates for payments of taxes has not been set yet but they are likely to be June 30 or July 30 for the first installment and September 30 for the second installment.

If you hire young people for new summer jobs, Ontario will help you pay their salaries.

Here's how the program works.

If you operate a business or farm and create new jobs between May 1 and October 31, 1978, the Ontario Youth Employment Program will give you a grant of \$1.25 per hour (up to a maximum of \$50.00 a week) towards the wages of each eligible youth you hire for those jobs.

Employers: Anyone who has carried on a business or operated a farm in Ontario for at least one year prior to May 1 may receive grants for up to 6 new positions per business location for eligible youth employees.

Employees: Employees must be at least 15 but not 25 years old on May 1, 1978. Employees cannot be directly related to the employer. Employees must reside and be eligible to work in Ontario.

Duration: The program is in effect for 25 weeks from May 1 through October



NOTE: Grant funds are limited. If you wish to hire a youth any time during the program's duration, please submit your application as soon as possible. In order to hire under the program you must first receive approval from the Ministry of Treasury. Applications for participation cannot be considered after September 4, 1978.
