French exchange students arrive at Centennial

Exchange students from Ecole Compagnons de Carlier in Ste. Foy, Quebec arrive this afternoon at Centennial middle school for the first part of the French exchange program. Two teachers and 45 students are expected to arrive by bus at the school at 5:30 p.m.

Edith Davidson, the Centennial teacher who originated the exchange of 24 students last year says that interest in the program has increased so greatly after last year's trip that 65 to 70 students applied for the program this year. Grade 8 students were given the preference and 45 Grade 7 and 8 students from Centennial will be returning to Ste. Foy to spend a few days with the students and their families.

Centennial students involved in the program have been meeting "at least once a week" since Christmas learning extra vocabulary and studying the French culture to prepare them for their trip, Mrs. Davidson says.

When they arrive the French students will be presented with Ontario pins by representatives of Centennial's Student Forum. They will get acquainted with their hosts and their families over a spaghetti dinner at the school prepared by Centennial students.

Thursday they are scheduled to take classes in English for part of the morning, then go to the Ontario Science Centre in the afternoon. There will be a

school dance in their honour Thursday evening.

Friday they will be taken to Niagara Falls and Marlehead and Saturday will be spent on the plans made by individual families to entertain their student. They return to Ste. Foy early Sunday morning.

Last year the busload of students from Ste. Foy was divided between Georgetown and Burlington. Burlington's exchange began last weekend.

Acton Optimists form

The newly formed Acton Optimists Club signed up several new members at its weekly meeting this week, bringing the club's membership to 92 per cent of the minimum requirement of 25 members.

Among the activities members enjoyed at the Kitchener Police Force was a discussion of the goals of Optimism led by Milton Optimist Dennis Kwasnicki and a members raffle which was won by new Optimist George Rommel. Proceeds from the raffle were presented with thanks to the meeting's hostess, Betty Johnston.

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Lung association has good year

Haltion Lung Association had a very successful Christmas Seal campaign president Hilda Clark reported to the association annual meeting in Burlington last week.

Ms. Clark said the final total of \$91,028.14 represents a 4 per cent increase over the funds raised in 1976 and is an association record for fundraising. Caution was expressed, however, over increasing expenses which have been trimmed to about six per cent.

Work carried out by the association includes smoking withdrawal clinics, asthma programs and the detection, prevention and control of tuberculosis.

During 1977 1,900 persons were given a pulmonary

screening with 6.5 per cent or 126 found to have abnormal function.

"For the most part these screenings take place in the large and medium size companies," C.A. Ludlow, chairman of the pulmonary function committee said.

"We are presently investigating the possibility of making the program available to smaller industries, using a van loaned on a temporary basis to the association."

Guest speaker at the meeting was General William Leonard, retired, director of the Haltion District Health Council.

Mr. Leonard outlined the structure and purpose of the health council through a slide presentation.

IOOF donation

Bruce Collins of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows - IOOF, Lodge 109, presented Mayor Tom Hill Monday with a \$500 cheque toward its Memorial Arena pledge. Mr. Collins said the second half of the pledge would be presented in the fall.

1,500 trees planted

Organizers say that at least two-thirds of the 443 Cubs and Scouts in the North Haltion district turned out to plant trees on Saturday for the Trees for Canada program. The boys planted 1,500 trees and shrubs at two Credit Valley Conservation Area sites, one north of Terra Cotta and the other at Meadowdale.

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Interim appointment?

The Haltion Regional Police Commission may have to appoint an interim superintendent to take charge of District 1, which covers Haltion Hills and Milton, if a decision has not been reached on a replacement for Superintendent Floyd Schwanitz by the time his resignation takes effect.

Haltion Police Chief Ken Skerrett said the position is open for all senior officers who wish to apply. All the applications are now in, and are being put together for review by the police commission.

Chief Skerrett would not say whether a date had been set for the commission to discuss the applications.

Supt. Schwanitz is resigning to take a position as chief of police in Timmins, where he will be in charge of a force of 71 officers and 15 civilians.

He was chief of police in Georgetown before the advent of the Haltion Regional Police force. He also served 21 years with the Kitchener Police Force.

Supt. Schwanitz's resignation will take effect May 21. Chief

Skerrett said if the commission has not reached a decision by then as to a replacement for the superintendent, the members will appoint an interim superintendent.

School break-ins

Schools had the worst of it this week, with a break-in and several broken windows.

Burglars broke into Stewarttown public school, gaining entry by forcing a window. A Toshiba 14-inch portable television was taken.

Five windows were broken at Park School on Hyde Park Drive some time between 11 and 5:30 p.m. on April 23.

An Acton man was arrested and charged after a break-in was reported at his residence on Crescent Street in Acton. The break-in was reported to have happened at between 6 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. on April 25. Over \$500 was taken. Most of the money was later recovered.

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Hydro fire arsonist sentenced to 2 years

A Georgetown man was sentenced to a total of two years less a day on charges of break and enter and arson in Peel County Court last week.

Kevin Jenkins, 21, of Haylawn Crescent, pleaded guilty to charges of break and enter and theft, and arson arising out of an incident at Georgetown Hydro on Aug. 19.

Jenkins was also convicted on charges of break and enter with intent to steal and a charge of arson in connection with break-ins at Crawford Construction and Technicon International in Brampton.

On the charge of arson at Georgetown Hydro, Mr. Jenkins was sentenced to serve a term of one year less a day. The sentence on the charge of breaking and entering with theft was three months, to be served concurrent to the one-year sentence.

On the charge of arson at Crawford Construction, Mr. Jenkins was sentenced to one year. This sentence will be consecutive to the sentence for arson committed at Georgetown Hydro. For the two charges of break and enter with intent to steal, the sentences were each three

months, to be served concurrent to the one-year sentence. In total, Jenkins will serve two years, less a day.

There will be a two-year probationary period in addition to the period of incarceration.

It was recommended that the sentences be served at the Ontario Correctional Institute in Brampton.

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Town urged to fight action

Haltion Hills council has directed that the town solicitor defend the town against a suit launched by L. and L. Ford of Acton.

Haltion Hills is named with the minister of transportation and communication, Haltion region and Union Gas Company, for damages amounting to \$40,000 arising out of the reconstruction of Main Street for four months last year.

The closing of Main Street and subsequent limited access to the company resulted in a serious business loss of \$40,000, according to the solicitors for L. and L. Ford.

The claim is to be heard by the land compensation board, but no date has been set for the hearing.

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
