Second Georgetown family to set sail

While the Rattenbury family of Ewing Street are just beginning the long haul of geling their 35-ft. steel-hulled yacht in the ocean, the Hughes family of Stockman Crescent reached the end of three years of construction on a similar-size fiberglass yacht Monday when it was taken away to a berth at the National Yacht Club on the Toronto waterfront.

Martin and Glenda Hughes' vessel completion is even more a product of their own creation han what the average boat builder produces because Mr. lughes molded the fiberglass hull himself, as well as finishing off the interior portion.

He bought the mold from an American firm and had it shipped to a firm near Toronto which allowed him to rent space to build his hull.

Originally the Hughes intended to use their yacht as a model to interest other boat lovers in fiberglass yachts which Mr. Hughes would build for them. He would mold the hulls for them at a kit price and give them help and advice on how to finish the boat themselves. A general rule of thumb on the cost of such craft is \$1,000 to \$1,200 per running foot but this can be cut in half by doing the finishing yourself, Mrs. Hughes says.

Mr. Hughes sells research and development equipment to hospitals but he's handy with tools and meticulous and thus managed to do all the finishing

work himself, his wife says. Mrs. Hughes' brother, Murray Barrett, a Toronto publisher, and his wife and family are co-owners of the boat and will be using it during the winter if their plans are fulfilled. The Hughes will use it

Their 8-year-old son Chris and their 7-year-old daughter Vicki have done very little sailing and so their adaptibility must be tested.

Mrs. Hughes says she did a little pleasure sailing before her marriage but her husband began sailing in his teens in Belleville and raced on Lake Onlario after he moved to Toronto. He was born in the Channel Islands.

Like the Rattenbury's Mrs. Hughes says they too had their share of curious drivers as

they worked on their boat Since Stockman is a fairly quiet street they weren't worried about drivers colliding with each other but they did wonder about the safety of a lamp post nearby as several drivers narrowly missed it and wound up on the edge of a lawn during their efforts to see what

was going on,

While the Rattenbury's prefer the strength of a steel hull for their craft, the Hughes chose fiberglass because it is lighter and by comparison to steel or concrete easier to work with. Mr. Hughes says he is still interested in molding a hull for prospective boat owners but the finishing off of the first model was important to him as a first step.

"Most people say they want to see what the finished product looks like before they order one," he says, "so we had to finish number one first.

The Completion weighs eight tons and has a 30 horsepower engine and sails. It sleeps


