## Signs, traffic island plans for Georgetown downtown

Herald staff writer Members of Georgetown Central Business Improvement Area viewed plans last week for signs and pedestrian islands slated for downtown Georgetown.

Architect Paul Martel reviewed for the group the three types of signs which will be erected downtown, probably in

Three of the signs will be eight feet by four feet and illuminated. They will be located at Maple Avenue and Main Street, Mill Street and Guelph Street and Guelph Street and Main Street. These signs will direct motorists to the downfown core.

A number of smaller signs, 24 inches by 36 inches, will be erected at the entrances to parking lots and walkways These signs will be metal and with reflective paint.

The color scheme of the signs is Terra Cotta brown with a green arrow to indicate parking or a blue arrow to indicate pedestrian walkways All the signs will feature the downtown logo.

As for traffic island will be built this year and Church Street and Main Street, Regtonal and town staff will monifor the island to see how drainage and street cleaning operations are affected. The islands are estimated to cost about \$5,000 and plans are to have them all constructed over a four year period


Other budget expenses are \$1,000 for an employee, \$500 for administration \$6,500 for monthly advertising supplements and \$2,000 for special events
