The Big Brother may be any mature man of good character, married or single, of any age or walk of life, who is willing to donate four hours of his time, one night a week to a boy in need of a friend. While there are such things as executive meetings volunteering to be a big brother doesn't require men to attend them. The background organization is only there to put the big and little brothers together and support them if difficulties should arise through the years. Mr. Wagner says.

"We aren't social workers," he says. "Big brothers aren't expected to solve a boy's problems. All they are, are friends to talk to and do things with. One-night a week is about as much as most people can spare from their time and that's why we don't expect them to attend organization meetings, unless they want to do so.

The little brother is usually a boy aged six to 16, who has lost the male figure in his life through death, divorce, desertion or separation. The group is now ready to receive applications from mothers in the area who feel their boys are in need of big brothers, Mr. Wagner

Review mileage

Halton Hills finance-administration committee has asked for a report on the mileage allowances paid to town employees who use their cars on town business.

Coun. Roy Booth told committee Monday that some employees are getting about 30 cents per mile. Those are the employees who get a \$60 per month car allowance plus 12 cents per mile up to 5,000 miles, and 10 cents per mile thereafter.

Other employees who use their vehicles only occasionally on town business are paid 20.5 cents per mile.

Coun. Peter Morris said the employees who need to have their cars at the disposal of the town get the \$60 per month allowance, "whether they use
