## Summer school courses

The summer school program will offer a variety of courses in English, mathematics, science, social studies, French, music, art, drama, recreation, remedial mathematics, remedial language, special education classes at senior elementary schools where there is sufficient registration to form classes.

Students from Grades 9 to 12 will be able to take credit courses for a new credit or to improve courses in which they were unsuccessful during the school year.

Because new credit courses require 30 hours of instruction, students will only be able to do one course per day. Repeat or make up courses require 35 hours of instruction, so students will be able to take two courses if they choose.

Adults who wish to do so may enroll in summer school courses by contacting Willard Price at the adult education office of the board of education.

The school summer program will also include a bilingual exchange with 44 students from Sorel, Quebec, driver education, general interest typing and English for new Canadians.

The elementary school program will be a joint operation with the Halton separate school board. It is a five-week program, beginning July 4, and offers remedial mathematics, remedial language and special education classes at senior elementary schools where there is sufficient registration to form classes.

Last year, 1,094 students participated in the elementary school program, and 1,296 students took part in the secondary school program. For further information, parents and students can call their home school, or the summer school office, at 335-3663.

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
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
