Golf week begins on May 13 for province's crippled children

Al Balding's Golf Week for Timmy received its official sendoff in Halton with a press conference last Friday at Wildwood Golf Club in Oakville.

Aside from golf pro Balding also present at the conference were Whipper Billy Watson, representing the Society for Crippled Children, Al Reulens, president of the Halton Regional Police Association, Jack Rénard, of Labatt's Breweries and this year's two Timmies Peter and Paul Settle of Ham

The Golf Week, which begins May 13 and runs to the 22nd at 150 rolf courses in central Ontario, is in its third year. It , is sponsored by Labatt's and your local police associa-

The event is open to all golfers, male or female, serious shooter or rank amateur. The handicap system is designed to give all golfers, regardless of ability, a chance of winning. No previous handicap proof is needed.

Entry fee for the event is \$10. That of course does not include the green fee. Eight dollars will go to Ontario Crippled Children's Society. The remainder will go to the local pro shop for prizes.

The event will actually culminate on June 27 with a winner's tournament of champions at Rolling Hills in Toronto Players can enter as often company name on a sign at the as they like.

The first year the tournament netted \$13,000 for cripnled children. Last year it rose to \$17,000 and this year Balding said the goal is \$20,000.

One new innovation to raise money, said Balding, is the selling of golf holes for the June 27 final tournament. Holes will be sold to individuals or companies for \$200 each. For that money, which will be used to pay for tournament dinner expenses, the buyer gets two tickets to the tournament, a tax receipt and his name or
