Birds in Peril by John P.S. Mackenzie (McGraw-IIII Ryerson: 19t pages; \$1 f.95) is the story of 20 endangered birds of Canada and the United States, how they became threatened species, their chances for surv-

ings by Terence Shortt Janet Foster's Working for Wildlife (University of Toronto Press; 271 pages; \$19.95) is a history of wildlife management and preservation in Canada, the first book of its kind and obviously essential reading for anyone involved in the

"It is end though safe to assume that the Eskimo curlew will soon be extinct," Mackenzie concludes,

The story of the large and striking ivory-billed woodpecker is simply told: The bird is "probably extinct." The last authenticated sighting was in 1952. The ivory-bill was even larger than the pileated woodpecker, and had the same dramatic black and white markings with vivid red crest.

The ivory-bills were used by Indians to design coronets, with the points of the bills turning outward. However, habitate destruction was the reat menace: Each pair of ivory-bills required about 2,000 acres of uncut forest the pileated has adapted to smaller woodlots and has a larger

Accounts of other endangered birds are equally saddening. The rest of the list includes the Eastern brown pelican, trumpeter swan, both Aleutian and giant Canada geese, Mexican duck, southern bald eagle. SILENCE IN CANADA Janet Foster's book is a highly interesting and detailed work representing years of research into early government files both in Ottawa and Washington, D.C. Il grew into the story of a few remarkable men, pioneers in the field, who over the years "were able to turn their own goals of wildlife preservation into a declared government pohcy."

The story is basically that the Canadian government was slow to realize that wildlife was an important resource and possibly a non-renewable one. While the United States in the mnetcenth century had the powerful voices of the Sierra Club and the National Audubon Society to enlighten the public, there was silence in Canada

Early concerns were expressed by Mounted Police, who, on their rounds, saw the rapid depletion of animal life, particularly of the plains biso-

In 1874, Cecil Denny, travelling through Saskatchewan with the NWMP, noted "untold thousands... the country being fairly black with them " Five years later, the same man reported that "the day of the buffalo on the plains was over

In 1892, Police Superintend ent Melliree warned the Minister of the Interior that unless methods of protection were introduced, "game in the Northwest would be a thing of the past." He recommended expansion of the small Rocky Mountains Park other 250 square miles:

This is the setting for the story of wildlife preservation in Canada, a story that almost began too late Foster's book is well documented in an appendix, and the text makes smooth, at times lively, read-

It is unfortunate that the book is discouragingly overpriced, \$19.95 seems too much to pay for a 283-page book with no color, illustrations, even though the 24 pages of early black and white photographs are tascenting, the text throughout admirable, and the subject so very worthwhile


