

Norval district news

Plans to celebrate the Queen's birthday at the Norval School Community Park on Monday, May 22nd, are well under way. The activities will start with a parade from the Presbyterian Church at 2 p.m. which will consist of Baton twirlers, four minor baseball teams, Brownies, Cubs and Scouts, decorated bicycles and small floats, a pony and cart, and entries for the Crazy Bed Race, etc. Rev. Ian MacPherson will provide the piper leadership for the parade down Draper Street to the park. Following the parade the beds will be judged, then there will be a ball game between the Hornby and Norval Squirts after which the Crazy Bed Race will be held. Art Reinhardt, president of the Norval Community Association, reported that contracts for connecting homes to the water mains can not be let or the cost estimated yet as the Halton Hills Regional government engineers have not studied the specifications required such as the size of pipe, valves, etc. needed. As soon as the specifications are known plumbers will be asked for an estimate on the cost of installing the water pipes from the lot line to the house and connecting up the water to the homes of those who wish to have this work done while the plumbers are working on their street.

Work on the water mains is progressing and water from Georgetown will be a reality this summer. The only question left unanswered now is how much it is going to cost? The answer won't be fully known until next year's tax bills arrive. By then the cost of connecting the water to the house and the cost of purchasing a water metre will be paid and the initial shock of having to pay regular water bills will be over.

Revealing the cost in small stages will eliminate the shock of learning how much the system is really going to cost each home owner, however, this is one village improvement that has been badly needed for many years so the sooner the project is finished the better for Norval. Water isn't missed until the well runs dry then the importance of water is really realized. Water worries will finally end for many home owners in the village when the project is finally finished but progress has to be paid for.
