

Pioneer Days preparations going ahead

Plans are shaping up well for Georgetown's Pioneer Days, according to the organization committee.

The three-day event scheduled for June 22, 23, and 24 will have six activity areas this year. Main Street will be cordoned off from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Thursday and Friday and from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturday. Activities are also scheduled for various times during the three days at the old arena, the fairgrounds, Cedarvale, the empty lot opposite Georgetown Hydro office and the big municipal parking lot.

Organizers say plans are underway to hold a three-day sidewalk sale on Main Street, as well as a bake sale, and strawberries social and various demonstrations and displays throughout the three days.

The Athlete of the Year award will be presented during a banquet in the Oddfellows Hall Thursday evening.

There is to be a two-day dog-sledging contest Friday and Saturday and the public are invited to assist merchants to the auction by purchasing H. Hill's Auction Sale at 877-2619. Saturday there will be a Farmers' Flea Market around the arena.

Saturday the Raiders and Gemini are sponsoring a Frontier Follies beer garden in the Memorial Arena. A giant hotbarbecue in the vacant lot opposite Georgetown Hydro is also planned for Saturday but a display of antique cars and antique farm equipment will be set up in the lot throughout the three-day event.

EBHO riding club are running a beginners horse show on Saturday with both English and Western riding divisions. There will also be a midway set up in the fairgrounds throughout the three days. Organizers are setting up an information booth and tickets for the midway rides will be available at that booth two for the price of one.

Sports events scheduled for the Saturday include a Kinsmen Girls softball tournament, a skateboard competition sponsored by North Halton Sports and organized by the Jaycees and a house league soccer tournament.

Area delegates at parents meet

Madam Justice Wilson, in a decision handed down last week, has ruled that the Ontario Education Act is unconstitutional. This decision has caused a great deal of concern among parents and school boards across the province.

The Ontario Parent Organization (OPO) is holding a series of workshops to discuss the implications of the decision and to develop strategies for dealing with the situation.

The workshops will be held in various parts of the province and will cover topics such as the role of parents in the school system, the importance of parental involvement, and the need for a more balanced approach to education.

Delegates from various areas are attending the workshops to share their experiences and to discuss ways in which they can work together to address the issues raised by the decision.

The workshops are being held at the request of the Ontario Parent Organization, which is a non-profit organization dedicated to promoting the interests of parents in the school system.

School children hear of NASA, aerospace

Teachers are always advised to make use of community resources as much as possible in their classroom work. Last week fourth grade teachers at George Kennedy public school took the advice to heart and called in Bob Daniell to help their pupils in their study of space.

Mr. Daniell has been a Georgetown resident for 10 years and an employee of SPAR Aerospace Products Ltd. of Toronto, for even longer.

The company began as the Special Products and Applied Research division of DeHavilland in Malton he says, but eventually broke away to become a company in its own right with two plants in Toronto, and one each in Montreal, Ottawa and the United States.

Mr. Daniell is a project engineering manager at SPAR. He says he frequently speaks to other engineers and to National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) groups, but this is the first time he has tackled getting the story of satellites and Canada's part in space exploration into terms a school child understands.

Board seeks public opinion

Halton Hills Library board will hold a special meeting, next Wednesday (May 31) at which the public will be invited to express an opinion on what to do about a library for Georgetown.

The board held an in camera session last week to discuss the alternatives open to it since the Ontario Municipal Board ruling put an end to a proposal to construct a new library at Cedarvale Park.

Board member Doug Magwood said the board discussed new sites and renovations and additions to the existing building at last week's meeting. The board will have suggestions to offer the public at the meeting next week but members are seeking in put from the public as well.

The meeting which will be held at the Halton Hills council chambers on Trafalgar Road at 8 p.m. is to give the public an opportunity to suggest ways in which the board can gather public opinion on the question of a new library.

"We want to hear how we should go about involving the public in our decision," says board chairman Dick Howell. "Should we send out a questionnaire or what should we do to find out what the public wants?"
