Other things that can be done are, constant supervision of children thus helping to reduce the number of 45 children who lost their lives because of no supervision.

Why should the Red Cross be interested in your backyard pool? The answer is very simple, 21 persons drowned in backyard pools in 1977.

The prime objective of the Red Cross Water Safety Division is to reduce the number of drownings in Ontario, not as many people think, to teach children to swim, but to teach "Water Safety".

Make sure you have sufficient reaching and throwing aids and of course making sure that all swimmers using your pool know how to do rescue breathing.

Your recreation department can help you with these things. Gather a dozen or so of your friends and neighbors and of course the children for a pool party.
