Acton Optimists chartered

The Optimists Club of Acton was awarded its charter by a representative of Optimists International Tuesday at what the club's first president, Bill Chagnon, called a landmark meeting for the community.

Field representative Paul Gorman of Pittsburgh was on hand to welcome 40 Acton area men into the fastest-growing service organization in North America.

The Acton club was sponsored and launched by members of the Milton chapter, particularly president-elect Dennis Kwasnicki and past president Bob Ives.

Also on hand for the inaugural meeting were Governor Bob Washby, secretary treasurer Don Rake and new club-building chairman Al Flood, all of the Optimists Ontario district, with Jim Windish, Lieutenant Governor of this area's zone, which includes eight chapters, and Ron Hudd, Don Knight and Bill McGinnis of Milton.

A massive charter banquet is being planned for July, and discussions have already opened the door to the formation of an Opti-Mrs. Club for Acton area women.

Elected vice presidents of the Acton chapter were Robert Hart and Dave Henderson. Bert Husman was appointed secretary-treasurer by new president Bill Chagnon. All will serve one-year terms except for their first terms which will continue until October, 1979.

Chosen as first-year directors were Harmen Vander Heyde and Al Burns, with Walter Barlow and Bill Johnston assuming two-year directorships and Dave Boycott and Clive Jago serving three years.

Mr. Gorman told the members that Ontario district is among the most successful Optimists districts in North America, at times taking second place only to Quebec-Marijuana in terms of activities and interest.

Today, he said, there are more than 3,500 Optimists on the continent and each is estimated to be helping out 11 youngsters, adding much credibility to the club's motto "Friend of Youth."

"We're not here to compete with the other service clubs," Mr. Gorman said. "They're all doing beautiful things, but put them all together and they're still not doing as much as the Optimists."

The Acton chapter will meet on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month.

Branding a sincere belief in the philosophical value of

optimism in daily life, the club's members regularly stage a variety of events aimed at educating and entertaining youngsters and encouraging good citizenship among both children and their parents. It is claimed in some communities that the formation of an Optimists chapter has resulted in noticeable changes in the outlook and attitudes of the citizenry in general.

The Optimists Club of Georgetown Bike Rodeo got underway Friday at St. Francis of Assisi School. The entire student body, about 200 pupils from Grade 1 to 6, participated in the day long safety program. The children had classroom sessions with their teachers on balance of bicycles, control of the bicycle, and all the safety rules.

After the classroom sessions, all the children went to the playground where a course was marked out for the practical part of the program.

And after all the children had gone through the course, they participated in a slow bike race.




