Police, landlord agree on station's repairs

Halton Regional Police Commission has reached agreement on the repairs needed to bring the Georgetown division building up to standard.

Police administrator R. A. Munro reported Thursday that he had had a meeting with Hy Gladman, owner of the building, that morning, and Mr. Gladman had agreed to undertake the repairs to the building at his own expense.

"The building is in abject and utler disrepair, and I would prefer my dog not spend the night there-I wouldn't," Mr. Munro said. "It's debilitating, demoralising and bloody well dangerous to life and

Mr. Munro said that as of 3 p.m. on May 17, he had made Mr. Gladman's agent responsible in law for any danger due to the state of the building.

Shortly afterward, Mr. Gladman returned from a trip to Florida and met with Mr. Munro and members of the staff to discuss the matter.

As a result of the meeting, a ist of necessary repairs was drawn up, and Mr. Gladman agreed to undertake them immediately.

They include the support and relevelling of the upstairs floors, refinishing of the walls and ceiling in the Identification mug shot room, new ceiling tiles on the main floor. installation of a cement floor in

the basement in the bicycle storage area, insulation of the pipes, the repairs of a leak in the rear half of the building and the securing of the sink to the wall in the men's room.

"My only comment is you ean't blame Mr. Gladman as an investor for trying to get his money out of it," commission chairman William Hourigan said. Part of the responsibility has to be attributed to the officers who inspected the building and the officers who fived with the problems he

"I don't entirely blame Mr. Gladman," Oakville Mayor Harry Barrett said. "This force and this commission didn't make more effort."

Mr. Munro said the repairs are not contingent on the renewal of the lease.

"Once we have information to the effect that the repairs have been completed, then we'll get back to the lease," commissioner Glen Magnuson
