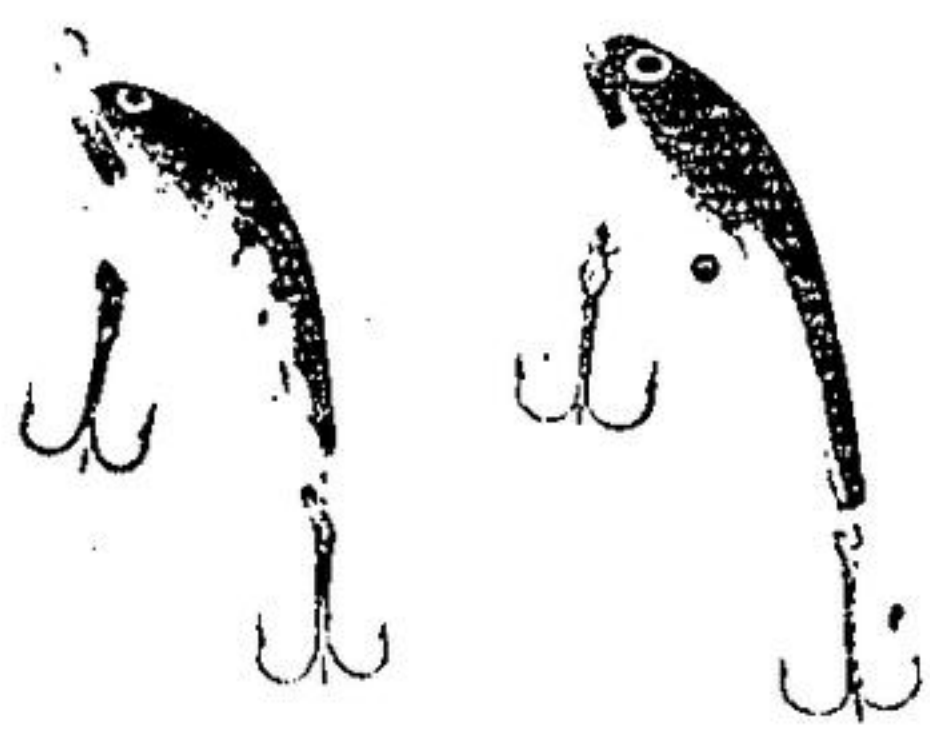


Ontario Outdoors

This weekend (June 31) sees the start of the Muskogee season. More commonly known as MUSKIE, it is our largest game fish in fresh water, and the methods of taking a Muskie are many and varied but the prize is well worth the effort. Only experience will show you what to use and how, even when you have a good teacher who has been fishing them for years. It is the little things that count, and even then you may "skunk" your teacher, as the Muskie is so unpredictable.

BASS of course is closed until June 17 at the earliest, and most areas open June 24th. The largemouth and smallmouth blackbass is somewhat more predictable, and much more available to the average fisherman. As we head down hill to the opening day of bass, I will try to make it a little easier to take the first bass of your life or to help you take bigger and more bass. The prime factor, of course, is to release more fish than you keep. Set yourself a size limit, as many fishermen do and don't go under that self-made goal. Land and release a bass carefully, and it may be caught as soon as the next day. The "Fat Rap" series of lures, those resembling the natural foodfish of the basses, is an excellent starter to put in your tackle box. In the near future I will give a run down of the newest rage in these lures, the "life-like" finishes by the large bait companies.

I am only waiting the materials from these manufacturers, and I only hope it arrives before the season opens, in order for me to go and put what I need for the year. Spinner baits are an excellent choice both for the largemouth and the smallmouth blackbasses. These are readily available now here in Ontario, and a wide selection should be in your tackle box at all times, as size, colour and number of blades make a difference on any particular day. I use a white or purple Bee Spin and find it extremely effective, although I do not limit myself to this lure. Next week a word or two on the use and selection of the new breed of plastic worms. Till then, remember that the protection of our recreation depends solely on your efforts and involvement in standing up for your rights in ONTARIO OUTDOORS.

Busy week coming for ball players

Dental Association backs face masks

The Ontario Dental Association has endorsed the recent decision of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association to make the wearing of face masks mandatory for Canada's minor hockey league players.

This responsible action by the CAHA should result in a marked reduction in the incidence of facial injuries among the more than 100,000 youngsters involved in the Metropolitan Toronto Hockey League, as well as thousands of players in house leagues throughout the province, says Dr. A.A. (Art) Stoyan, President, Ontario Dental Association.

Response has been "tremendous" according to Dr. Stoyan, who says the Association has filed requests for more than 35,000 brochures during the past year.

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"Studies of sports injuries among children and young adults have shown that the mouth is the most commonly injured area of the body. And, although damaged teeth can be skillfully restored by a dentist, they cannot heal themselves.

"Prevention of these and other serious facial injuries is the solution."

The Ontario Dental Association, in its efforts to communicate the need for mouth and face protection in contact sports, has distributed brochures throughout the province, recommending rigid, fixed position external mouthguards as the most effective single way of preventing sports injuries to teeth, gums and tongue.
