Last year's Central Junior "B" teams have been given a June 15 deadline to declare whether or not they will be operative this year.

Larry Robertson, convenor of the league, said he does not know whether any of the teams will be operative.

"It's all up in the air;" Robertson said. "None of the teams have said they will be fielding teams next year ... it's a real mess."

Most of the teams will be meeting with their executive this week to decide if they will field a team next year. Most of

the teams are waiting for other operations to declare before they make a decision.

Representatives from the eight "old" teams and four "new" teams met with officials of the O.H.A. a week ago Monday in Milton to discuss the proposed realignment. Later in the week Ladds phoned Robertson to tell him the O.H.A. had decided to add the four teams to his league.

One of the leams that is disappointed at the decision is the Georgetown Gemini.

General manager Bob Tost said he was very disappointed at the decision and he doubts that the Gems will operate next year.

"The realignment means that it will cost us an extra \$1,000 next year in travelling alone," Tost said, "Unless we can get more sponsors to carry us through I can't see us operating next year."
