WATER SAFETY WEEK + JUNE 4 - 10, 1978



If you could constantly watch your pool, chances are, nobody would drown in it. Trouble is, you can't keep your eyes glued to your pool 24 hours a day. It's especially difficult if you're not home. And that's precisely when some uninvited person could slip in and accidentally drown. You've got to stop him.

Now there are many ways to do this.

Putting a man-eating shark into your pool will stop many people dead in their tracks. Placing a hungry crocodile on the diving board or on the deck has been known to scare the bathing out of others. A patrolling security guard armed with a bazooka, most certainly would deter even the spunkiest rascals.

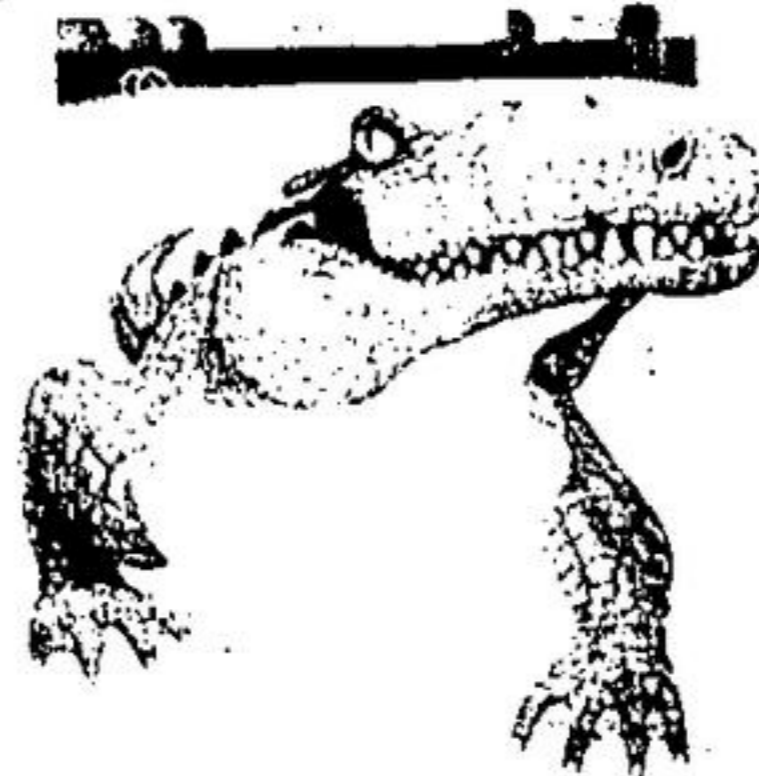
But most likely, you're an enlightened individual who would consider stopping an intruder in a more humane way. The way the law requires you to do it. Like with a fence. How ingenious.

Now that you've got a fence to keep the outsiders out, what about the insiders? You know, the people who eat breakfast with you and live in your house. How can you protect them?

Easy. Just follow the following tips.

1. Never leave the kids to puddle around in the pool alone. Never. Not for one minute. Not even to go to the kitchen to answer the phone.
2. Swimming lessons for the small fry are most advisable.
3. Know how to do artificial respiration.
4. Have safety equipment like a long reaching pole and a life preserver. Also have a first-aid kit on hand.

There's an easier way to stop someone from drowning in your backyard pool.

5. Separate the shallow end from the deep end with a buoy line.
6. Display emergency phone numbers beside your phone (doctor, fire department, police, ambulance). Just in case.
7. Have a few simple pool rules like no pushing or swimming alone.
8. Also remember, you'll go down quicker if you're swimming under the influence of liquor.
