Flowers are an integral part of weddings and fashions in them change just as

much as in clothes.
Today's bride prefers simple garden-type bouquets for herself and her attendants rather than the formal effect Javored in the past

As far as the church goes one well-known city florist sury "we do not have as many standards as formerly. We make more round decorations, and a lot of pew end

floral arrangements. Instead of decorating the whole church, the trend now is to have two or three simple arrangements adorning the altar. These may be either in stark white or in soft colors to blend with the bridesmaids' ensembles.

"We never make a bride's bouquet of carnations any more" the florist added "Baby roses and miniature carnations are quite popular as are small white orchids. It's a case of small flowers rather than the big. We use a great amount of marguer-

Another well-known city florist remarked that "only a few brides today use traditional white flower. They prefer the loose nosegay type, for a natural-looking effect, in brighter colors."

One florist likes the bride to consult with them "not more than two weeks before the wedding so we know what flowers will be availa ) e. We always ask for sample of the bridesmaids' dresses so we can harmonize the bou-Generally, the attendants

all carry the same flowers in

the same style, to be decided upon by the bride in consulta-tion with her florist.

If the bridegroom, best man and ushers are to wear boutonnieres, they are usualy white.

Some florists like to differentiate between the bridegroom and his attendants. Perhaps give the bridegroom a white rose and the others, white carnations.

Florists suggest that corsages for the mothers of both bride and bridegroom be of the same flowers but in colors to match each woman's costume.

"Quite frequently if the mothers are wearing ornate gowns with sequins and jew-elled trim they do not want any flowers at all," said a

This same florist likes to deliver the bouquets to the bride's residence an hour before the wedding in warm weather, "sometimes earlier if photographs are to be taken. The later we deliver the more likely they are to remain fresh right through

Church flowers are put in place either the morning of the ceremony or night before if the ceremony is an early

The bridegroom's boutonniere is often delivered with his mother's corsage and father's button-hole. Frequently the ushers' bouton nieres are delivered to the church.

Flowers have seasonable limitations so be sure to consult your florist early, in

wedding planning. He can tell you which flowers will be in season at the time of your wedding and which ones will stay fresh the longest

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


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
