

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Acton Outers Club return from trip

The Acton Outers have recently returned from a canoeing trip to Algonquin Park. They are a group of students and staff members from Acton High school who are interested in nature and the environment.

The Outers were started in 1970 by Wally Rowley and Paul Tamblyn. These two teachers got the idea to start the club while attending summer teaching sessions at Queens University in Kingston. It was there that they met Bob Pieh, from the Minnesota Oulward Bound School, who inspired them to set up an Outers Club as an extra curricular activity at Acton high.

That first year, there were approximately 25-30 members, and the club organized only one major trip, that being a five day canoe trip to Killarney Provincial Park.

The number of activities the Outers offers have increased and expanded since the first year. This year there have been canoe trips to Killarney and Algonquin Provincial Parks, as well as many one day only activities. Students have been taken rock climbing at Rattlesnake Point, crosscountry skiing, and hiking along the Radial Line and the Bruce Trail. Many members have also been introduced to orienteering. One activity which Outers president Cliff Britton hopes to have organized by the end of the school year is an overnight bieycle trip.

Membership in the club has increased along with the variety of activities offered. Britton sees more junior students than senior students taking part in Outers in the last couple of years, but feels this is a good thing because it

"means we will always continue as a club," Only a minority of those taking part in activities are actually club members, that is those who have collected points. Points are given to people who participate on work crews set up to raise money for the Outers. Members are awarded one point for every half hour they work latter, when major, overnight trips are organized, only students with points are allowed to go, those with the most points getting first

choice. "If they help the club, and raise money to do things, then those people should have first choice to go on overnight trips," explained Britton.

Each time a members goes on an overnight trip, he loses five points, in order to keep the same people from going on all the trips. Activities which take place during the day only are open to any student who wishes to go, regardless of the number of points they have.

When asked about the benefits of such experiences, Britton replied: "People have gone on these trips with no experience at all. They learn new skills and endup doing things they never imagined they could have done before." Member begin to appreciate nature and deal with the environment more effectively than they previously had.

It is a lotally different experience from the academic idea of school. Participants learn more about themselves and grow through their experiences in the wilderness.

One thing they have just recently started doing on most lengthy trips is having "solos" where individuals are dropped off by themselves for a period of time, usually 24 hours, with no one else nearby.

"I think the aloneness is the key thing. Just spending that time by yourself in the wilderness with all the sounds and noises. It gives you time to think," said teacher Rick Boychuk. The Outers Club raises

money mainly through class and paper drives in Acton. In

1977, they received a Wintario grant of \$1,000 to help offset costs of travel and equipment. They recently had a canoe trailer built that can hold

Sports Around Acton High

Athletic trophics are awarded in most schools in this area. The athletic department at Acton high school view these trophies mainly as an incentive, and feel that participation in sports has increased since the trophics were

first awarded, four years ago. I feel this practice should be abandoned as it uses outside stimulation to achieve results, and breeds more competition in an area where competition is already rampant.

Instead of helping an athlete to believe in his or her ability to perform, trophies act more as praise in that they are used as a reward for living up to certain standards. They are used as external motivators, and once this motivation is taken away, the person may lose the desire for physical activity. A better way to motivate athletes would be through encouragement given for effort. Encouragement would act as an internal stimulant rather than an athlete having to meet certain external standards,

which trophies act as. I also feel that singling out individual athletes as being "most valuable" or "outstanding", tends to take away from team spirit, and create rivalry on a team. Instead of playing together as a team to win a game, players sometimes become so obsessed with scoring the most points or being the most prominent player that they become less team-oriented. Many athletes crave recognition, and some see the ultimate recognition in being named "most valuable" or "outstanding". I feel that rivalry on teams for "the best player", could be greatly decreased if the practice of awarding trophles were to be

discontinued. It also tends to be discouraging and create bad feelings when trophies are awarded to the same athlete year after year, as in the case of one athlete being named "Outstanding Female Athlete" three years in a row at Acton high. Equally discouraging is the practice of awarding one person more than one trophy a year. If trophies are to be used as incentive, giving one athlete the same trophy year after year, or more than one a year, is not accomplishing this purpose. In addition, these practices often lead to questions of favortism. People begin to wonder if an athlete was really that deserving of the trophies, or if he or she was just well liked.

Athletic letters and tabs given to all participants in the athletic program should be kept, as these acknowledge effort and tend to create more positive incentive than do trophies. Only exceptional teams can win games when there is individual rivalry within the team. The area of sports is already for too competitive, and the awarding of trophics helps to increase this competitiveness. All athletes on a team help and contribute to that team, and to single out individual players is to me a great injustice.
