Ontario Outdoors

STOP! It's illegal. Those persons in ACTON that are fishing for and keeping BASS are breaking the law. I know that a lot of young people are taking these fish home, but ADULTS are setting a bad example by taking Bass out of Fairy Lake and these are often no more than 6 inches long. That is the best way I know of to clean out a lake, and Fairy Lake is high on the list of lakes that will soon be void of bass.

I have already phoned the Ministry of Natural Resources and reported this flagrant breaking of the fish and game laws, and have their promise to book anyone caught fishing bass out of season.

Last Saturday (June 10) the ministry caught 10 fishermen at Scotch Block reservoir fishing for bass, and laid charges on two that had bass in their possession.

If you see anyone breaking the fish and game laws, call ZENITH 25800, a no-charge number and report it immediately. If your children bring home illegal fish you also may be charged with possession, so better to tell them before they go out.

The bass in Acton have a hard enough time trying to survive with the ducks spoiling their spawning beds, and keeping the bass from reproducing. Another serious breaking of the Fish and Game laws is the destruction and/or disturbing of the ducks nests on Fairy Lake. I do not agree with the feeding or encouraging of these ducks, but don't like the way they are being pelted with stones by kids in the area of the park. Just stop feeding these ducks in the winter and they will eventually stop coming, and those that stay all winter will go back to their natural way of life.

A Canada-Ontario mercury study is now underway. This will take place in the ENGLISH-WABIGON RIVER system and should give answers to many of the questions that are being asked on pollution in that area of our province.

The main contamination was traced to long term discharges from a chlor-alkali plant connected to a pulp and paper mill at Dryden operated by Reed Paper Co. The process has been replaced with a system that does not use mercury and the study will define the extent of contamination, and how mercury moves through the aquatic food chain. Knowledge of this movement may lead to practical measures to remove mercury from the environment.

The Ontario Ministry of the Environment has hired 422 students for the summer to work on projects ranging from the effects of mercury to the composting of 300 tons

per month of organic waste from the Ontario Food Terminal.

On the subject of waste, Halton Hills Conservation Centre, on Mountview at Guelph Street, has copies of the free book, The Garbage Book. This booklet should help you better conserve that precious commodity, the dollar. It describes how to save energy and money by throwing out less, and just think what it will do for our environment.

Head on over to 232 Guelph Street, in Georgetown and check out the many book and ideas available for the energy and conservation minded people in Ontario, mostly free.

And at the same address there will be a SOLAR SEMINAR on June 14 (today) with methods of heating your pool or house water by solar systems.

Coffee provided, just bring your own coffee cup, another method of conserving in this case is throw away cups.

Bass Fishing, this has got to be one of the most exciting outdoor pastimes imaginable. For those who have not tried Bass fishing, don't knock it. This is something that seems to grow on you as you become more proficient at the skills involved. The use of the new breed of "plastic" worms has revolutionized the sport with the introduction of the soft, moist feeling plastics.

They come in all shapes, sizes and colors and I have taken fish on a black nine-inch worm and they come bigger than that. Mostly though the size will be six inches and the colour to use is black or purple in the early morning, and as the sun gets brighter, change to blue or green.

In late afternoon, change back to black or purple and use this as the basis for your own trails. Vary the size and color until you find what works best for you, then stick with it, but just remember to vary this periodically as bass will fool you just about every time out. There is no hard and fast rule for bass fishing, just guidelines to use as a starter.

These worms are more for Large Mouth but the Small Mouth will also take them, but they should be the smaller size.

June 22, 23 and 24 will be the Pioneer Days in Downtown Georgetown and I would encourage everyone to take part. There will be activities for the whole family and I will be there for the three days with demonstrations and contests. The prizes are excellent, one being a ZEBCO Rod and Reel set valued at about \$40. 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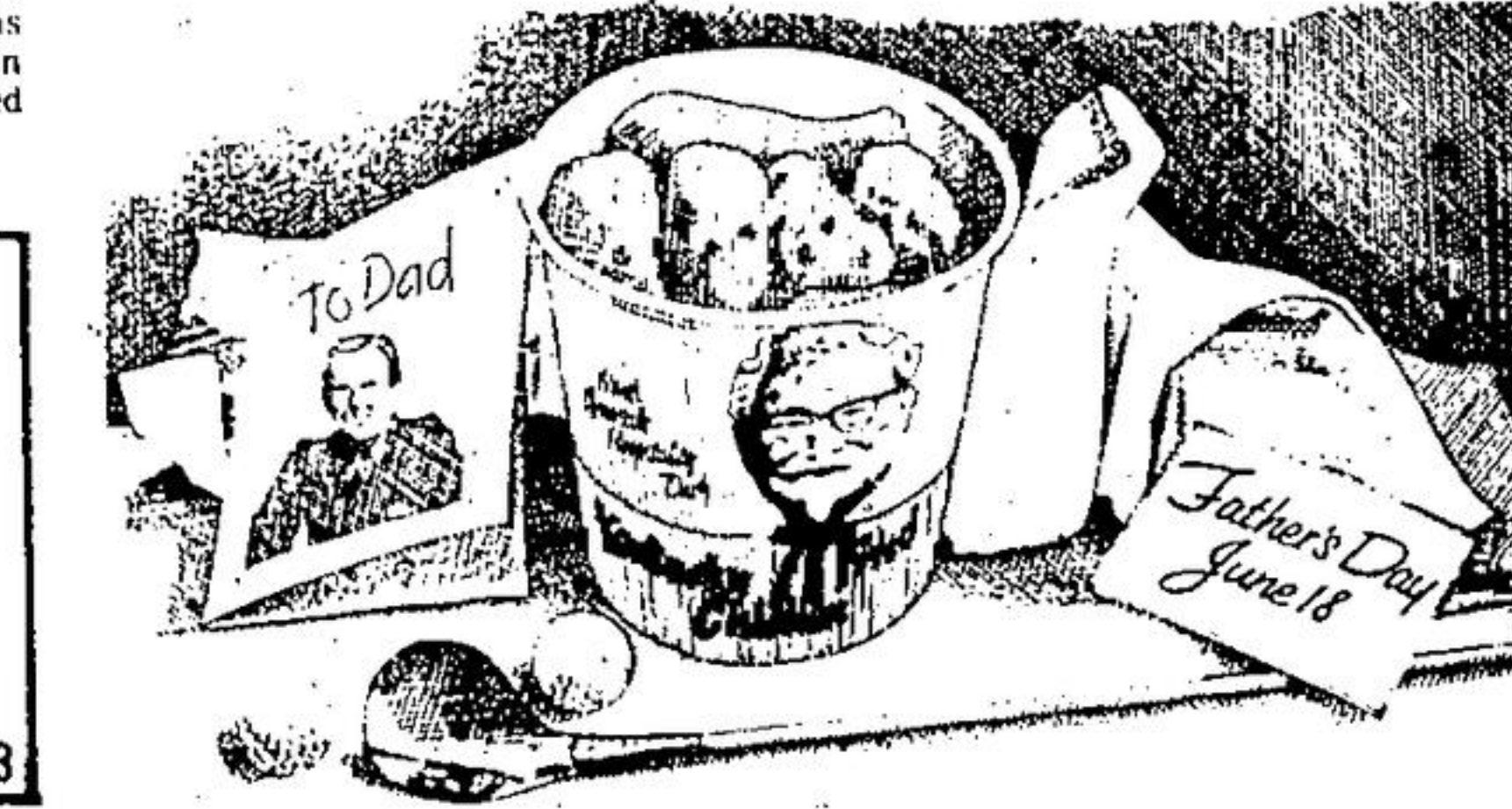
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
