

Phillips and Paterson take major awards

Two senior athletes, Nancy Phillips and Dave Paterson, won the two major awards at Georgetown district high school's annual awards night on June 15.

Phillips was named the school's top female athlete for 1977-78 and Paterson took the same prize in the male section.

Both athletes participated in three sports during the school year.

Phillips was a strong performer on the basketball, volleyball and soccer teams. Each of those teams came close to winning either the Halton or Peel-Halton, but lost in the final game.

Paterson was on the roster of the football, rugby and wrestling teams. He was one of the leaders on the wrestling teams which finished second in the province after taking the Halton and Peel-Halton championships.

Phillips was given the Mary Patterson Award and Paterson

was presented with the Fokkens Award.

Other major award winners of the evening were Don Farkas, Alice Armstrong and Gord Miller.

Farkas was presented with the P. Legge Award which goes annually to the student who has won the senior athletic award and who has also achieved the highest academic standing.

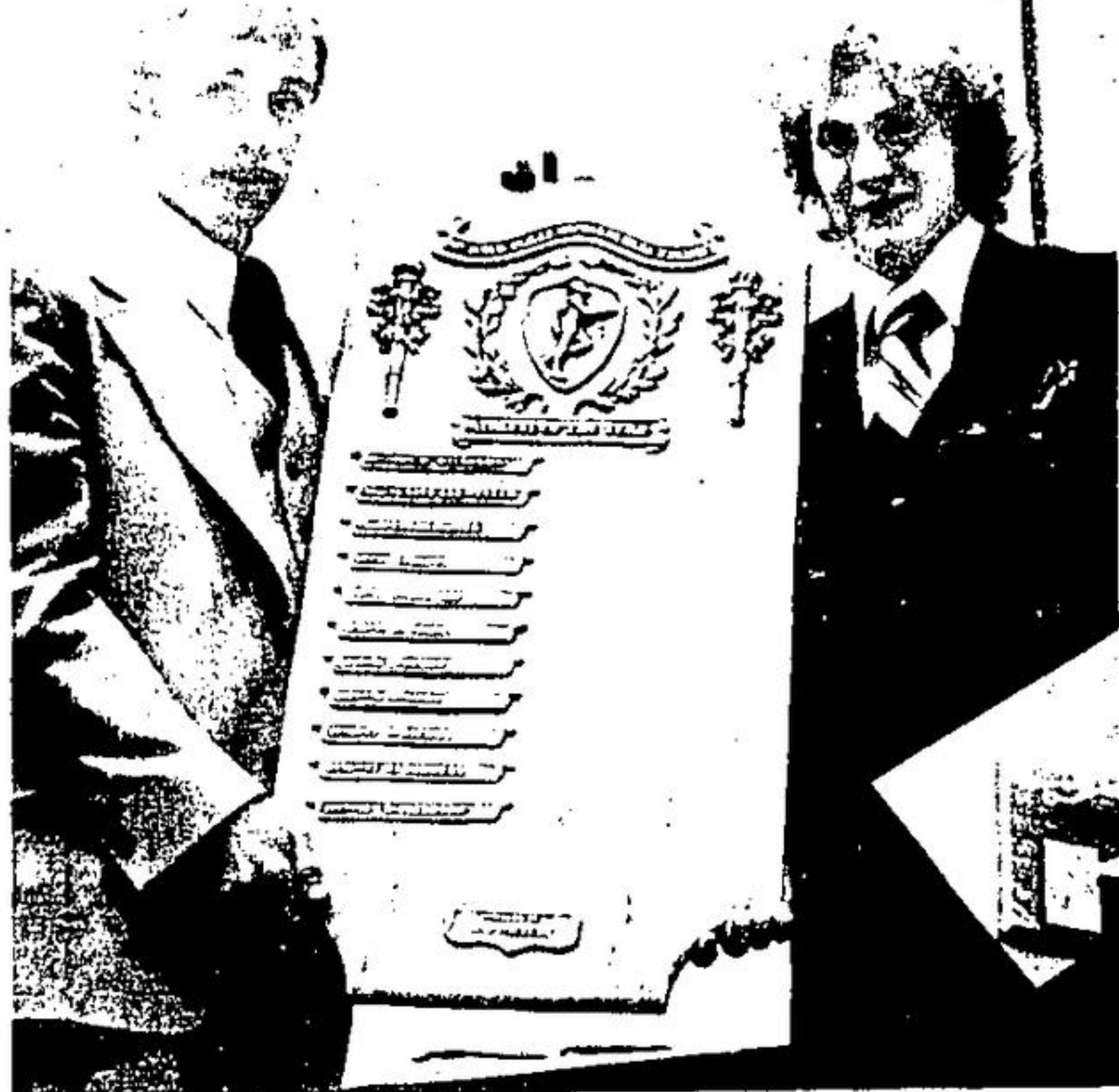

Karate deteriorating?

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Bill Hines, who owns The Karate Dojo in Toronto and has been in the sport for 13 years, said if the sport has deteriorated it is because of kickboxing.

"I think if the sport is deteriorating, Wally Sloeki is helping it do so by supporting kick boxing," Hines said.

Hines said he sees karate as a nonviolent art. "Kick boxing is the Americanization of the art form," he said. "As an art form I think that karate is growing."

Hines said that kick boxing and karate should be separated because they are two totally different sports.

"Many young people get into karate because of the brass and ego thing," Hines said. "At my school I stress nonviolence and get more into the spiritual and mental aspects of the art."

Pickells said he prefers not to instruct people who are in karate for the violent aspects.

"I prefer not to instruct people who get into karate to settle a grudge or something like that," Pickells said. "For one thing they usually do not stay in karate for very long anyway."

DeLorenzis and Pickells both said that the road karate takes depends totally on the instructors.

"If instructors approach karate as an art form and as non-violent then the students will do the same," DeLorenzis said.

"I think that the students that are in it now train harder than they used to and want to become as good as they possibly can at the art."

Of the three, Hines has the biggest club with a membership of approximately 175 stu-

dents. "I haven't got that big club right now because I'm just interested in having students who are in it as an art form."

"Noncontact karate has not received the coverage that kick boxing has," Hines said. "But it is noncontact karate that is growing."

Pickells took particular exception to today's karate people being labelled as cheaters and salesmen by Sloeki.

"You go to these tournaments and you'll see that the competitors are in great shape and work hard to maintain their level in karate," he said. "Nothing should be taken

away from the champions of today."

Pickells says there are competitors from Sloeki's heyday still at tournaments, but that they are consistently getting defeated by younger people. "Maybe that's why they don't like what they see."

DeLorenzis agreed with Pickells in saying that karate men of today are in excellent shape. "Some of them make training for tournaments a full time thing," he said.

"Most of the karate people are interested in training very hard because they want to become better than they were a year ago."
