# Norval school to make way for tennis courts

Norval Community Association has decided to trade in the community's original school for tennis courts.

The decision against remodelling the old structure was reaffirmed at a meeting last week which was attended by the committee executive and three members of Halton Hills council, A.C. Patterson, Russ Miller and Pete Pomeroy.

Of the 15 residents present only Bob Crawford felt strongly about retaining the old building, says Norval Community Association president At Reinhardt.

"It would be nice to save the building but it would be a horrendous job to restore it," he says. "There are bad cracks in the structure where the water has got in and the ceiling is all caved in."

The association would like to see some of the old bricks used to build a cairn as a memorial but they feel the building is dangerous and should come down.

"There are no grants that will cover the total cost of restoring it," Mr. Reinhardt says, "and what would it be used for if it were restored?" It would make a lovely library but they're having problems in Georgetown now and we're a small community. It would also make a nice arts centre for little old ladies doing batik and things or for fellows doing wood carving, but what happens if they don't sell their goods to pay their rent?"

The present quarters in a more recently closed school are "very useful and being extensively used" Mr. Reinhardt says, and the group would like to be sure they will have these quarters for some considerable period. This assurance will be sought at the same time that council is requested to demolish the original building and replace it with a tennis court.

No one is exactly certain of the age of the original school although Mr. Reinhardt has been told that the style of architecture is that brought to Canada by United Empire Lo-

yalists who first settled the area.

A plaque dates the original school as founded in 1840.

The school was closed with the opening of a new school in 1953. This school too has been closed and is now used as the

community centre. Halton Hills recreation director Glen Gray has placed an advertisement for demolition

terfers but assures the group, the building could still be saved if sufficient interest is shown in the project.

## Contract awarded

OTTAWA (Bureau) — Varian Associates of Canada Ltd. of Halton Hills has received two federal government contracts, the department of supply and services has announced.

The firm received a \$37,631 contract to supply electron tubes to the department of national defence, and an \$11,691 contract to supply laboratory equipment to the agriculture department.

They were among 344 contracts worth \$10,000 or more that were awarded to Canadian firms on behalf of federal departments and agencies in the week ending June 9. Total value of the contracts amounted to \$35,885,694.

## Approve vocational school at E. C. Drury school site

Halton board of education approved in principle the construction of a high school for academic, vocational and trainable mentally handicapped secondary school students on the site of E.C. Drury school in Milton.

The proposal was drawn up by several members of the school organization and design council at the request of the board, after previous proposals by committees of the council in 1973 and 1976 were shelved.

Tom Moore, a vice-principal of Burlington central high school, and Glenn Nichol, Associate Head at General Wolfe high school, presented the committee's proposal to the board, comparing the two proposals from which the board made its decision.

The committee was asked to draw up a report on the comparative advantages of building a new facility on a site owned by the board next to the Milton arena, and building whatever facilities would be necessary on the site of E.C. Drury school to accommodate the students, who would then use the shops and other facilities already available at the E.C. Drury school.

"The technical and vocational facilities at E.C. Drury school are not only adequate, they're outstanding," Mr. Moore said. Some of the more specialized shops, such as laundries and dry cleaning facilities, would be too expensive for the board to consider including in a new building, but they are available at E.C. Drury, he added.

Other facilities available at E.C. Drury include a triple gymnasium, and auditorium, a cafeteria and indoor pool, sports facilities such as soccer fields and tennis courts, a television studio and sixteen shops.

The committee estimated the cost of building a new school on the board-owned site at approximately \$5,652,000 while construction of facilities which would need to be added at E.C. Drury would cost about \$3,010,000.

Bruce Lindley, superintendent of business and finance, said the maintenance costs would be higher for the proposed facility on the E. C. Drury site than in a new building. However, he said that in the agreement with the appropriate provincial government

agencies for use of the facilities, the maintenance costs would be pegged at the current cost per pupil in the rest of the system.

Education director Emmerston Lavender cautioned the board that the proposal could contain difficulties, not only in reaching an acceptable agreement with the appropriate government ministries, but in attempting to integrate academic, vocational and trainable mentally handicapped students.

This will have been untried anywhere in Canada, he said, and the process may not unfold as it should.

Burlington trustee E. Riehm said, "I think the school will be a success if it meets the needs of each of the student types it serves."

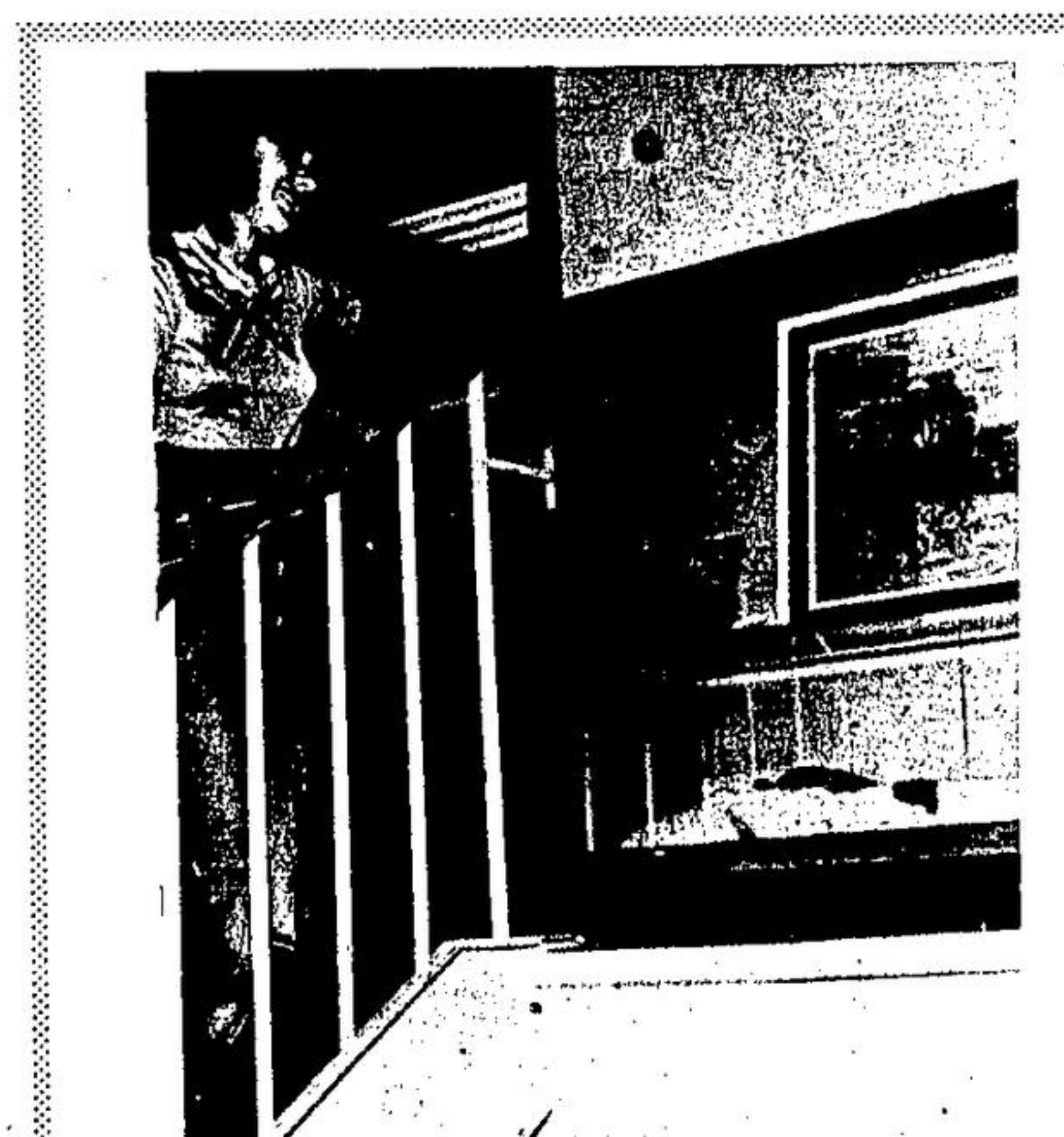
