CVCA awarded grant

A provincial grant of \$26,400 to the Credit Valley Conservation Authority will provide improvements to recreational facilities, roads, swimming areas and pienic sites in five conservation areas operated by the authority.


Natural Resources Minister -Frank S. Miller said today that The Authority's development program would include Meadowvale and Belfountain Conservation Areas in Peel, the Monora and Orangeville Reservoir Conservation Areas in Dufferin and Simcoe, and Terra Cotta Conservation Area in Hallon.

A total of 3,710 hectares (1,546 acres) will be subject to landscaping, grading and levdelling of roads. Renovations will also be made to existing recreational facilities and new lacilities will be constructed if


