Smith tourney raises \$3,200

Georgetown's Bob Monckton won Bill Smith's annual tournament for the Cancer Society held at North Halton Golf and Country on Monday with a great round of 73.

Monckton had a four-shot edge over Dale Dulmage of Barrie who took the inaugural tournament last year.

Three golfers came in with good scores of 79. They were Don Andersen, Al Dempster and Harvey Thomas. Thomas is from Georgetown.

None other than the man

himself, Bill Smith, took the top prize in the low gross competition. With his handicap determined by club pro Don Fendley, Smith had a score of 60 to win by two strokes over Ron McKenzie. Ray Ker-Taylor had a 63. Two Georgetown Golfers Paul Armstrong and Graham Farnell, shot 64.

The real winner of the tournament was the Cancer Society as Smith said almost \$3,200 was raised. Last year the tournament raised \$2,000 in its first year.

Smith is setting next year's goal at \$5,000 as both fees and pins will be sold to advertisers.

The Grey Cup draw was won by Ted Gorth. He will get two tickets to this year's Grey Cup and accommodation at the Hotel Toronto.

Smith said 86 golfers took part in the tournament. Last year 41 golfers took part.

Georgetown wrestlers fair well

Georgetown wrestlers fared well at the Summer meet held at the Etobicoke Olympium on Sunday.

Jim Hall, who is one of the coaches of the Canadian National Junior Team, said although there were not many wrestlers in each class at Etobicoke all the ones that did compete were top flight.

Five of the Georgetown wrestlers took firsts in their classes. Mike Wroblewski won at 44 kilos, Chris Manhire at 48,

and Wayne Manuel at 62. Those three wrestlers are from Centennial and coached by Hall during the regular season.

Two wrestlers from Bob McKay's team at Georgetown district high school also took firsts. They were Bill Davis at 59 kilos and Bob Dean at 73 kilos.

Two Centennial wrestlers and two high schoolers also took second. Kevin Frank and Kirk Warnock, both from

Centennial, were second in the 41 and 52 kilo classes respectively. Mike Taylor at 40 kilos and Keith Ledger at 55 also took second.

John Hoffdahl from Centennial was third in the 52 kilo class.

Tryouts for the National team will be July 15 and 16 at Centennial school. Thirteen and 14-year old wrestlers will tryout the first day and 15 and 16 year-old wrestlers the next.

Hall said the team is in need of billets for some of the wrestlers coming to tryout. Hall expects wrestlers from throughout Ontario and a couple from outside the province to tryout for the team.

Hall said he does not expect there will be more than five or six wrestlers in each of the classes. However, he said all the wrestlers trying out for the team will be among Canada's best.

"All the kids trying out for the team will be very good wrestlers," Hall said. "There will be a few Ontario champions trying out."

Hall said he is hopeful a couple of Georgetown wrestlers will crack the national lineup. Georgetown had three wrestlers win in their classes at the Ontario Schoolboy tournament held here during the season. They were Maurice, Frank and Warnock.

The billeting for the tryouts will be for either two days or eight days, depending on whether or not they make the team.

EXPLANATORY NOTES RE RESTRICTED AREA BY-LAW AMENDMENT APPEAL AND OFFICIAL PLAN AMENDMENT REFERRAL



The existing restricted area by-law permits Agriculture and Open Space uses on the subject lands. The purpose and effect of the proposed amendment is to permit the construction, operation and maintenance by Ontario Hydro of high voltage transmission lines and uses incidental thereto as shown on the draft schedules attached to the proposed by-law.

The existing official plan designation of the subject lands is Rural, Recreational-Conservation, Hazard Lands and Special Policy Area. The purpose and effect of the proposed amendment is to permit the construction, operation and maintenance by Ontario Hydro of high voltage transmission lines and uses incidental thereto within the corridor shown on the map attached to the draft official plan amendment.

The proposed official plan amendment corresponds with amendments contained in the restricted area by-law amendment appeal.
