

#### Basketball league started in Acton

A basketball camp-league has been started in Acton over the summer by Acton resident, and physical education and geography teacher at Acton high school, Rick McArthur, At present in its second week

of operation, the 100 participants meet every Monday night to go over basketball skills and play games against other teams in their division.

There are three seperate divisions in the program, 12-14 years old, 14-16 years old, and 16 and over. Each team has at least eight players, and altogether there are 12 teams. Although the younger girls play against girls only, those in the 16 and over category play co-ed basketball, McArthur now thinks this is a good thing, although at first he favored having seperate nights for boys and girls, and feels it

One of the reasons for running the camp-league once a week over the summer was to improve the level of basketball in area schools.

"In the past four years that I've been in Acton I've seen a tremendous Improvement in basketball at all levels," comments McArthur. "This is sort of a development system. If you're going to develop a good program, you have to have a phase of it going throughout the year. It's mainly for practice, it doesn't have to be competitive"

ball film is brought in every week, and coaching is done by both senior students and people from the community. An outline is given to coaches each week to ensure that all players are learning the same thing at the same time. This type of system also makes certain that all fundamental

skills are covered by each ceach. McArthur admits that at times the program "seems disorganized, but the less organization you do, the less work you will have." He feels that a certain amount of disorganization is good, as the participants then feel less structured and are more likely to enjoy the

activity. All participants in the program had to pay a \$4 registration fee, which went to cover the cost of team t-shirts. Mc-Arthur feels "it's worth \$4 just to be able to use the facilities". These usually empty facilities in summer were another thing that got him going on this

basketball program. "I felt there was a place for something to happen in the schools. Very seldom are they used in the summer."

A basketball camp-league is a great way to make use of usually vacant facilities in summer, as well as provide recreation, enjoyment, and a learning experience to the community.
